LONDON, Nov. 19. High Court of Admiralty .- On Friday the Right Hon. Sir Wm. Scott proceed--ed to the adjudication of the following ship case :

La Anna, Laporte, master. This vessel, laden with a cargo of Merchandize and specie, was seized by the private ship of war Minerva, John Siewart, communder, and brought to London. It was contesded, on the part of the claimants in the case that the vessel in question was captured within the territory and jurisdiction of the U. States of America-ship and cargo restored, and the question of costs and damage's reserved till next court day.

Will it be believed that the injuries to our Commerce are to be justissed under the pretence, that in time of war the neutral nations ought to have no advantage from a trade which they had not in time of peace? To what else does the language amount, which tells us that in war, nations at war are not obliged to inclulge a trade which would not be permitted in time of peace? How far short of such regulations are the principles which are offered as excuses for English depredations?
