Without being particularly authorised, we have taken the liberty of presenting our readers with the complete list of Laws passed by the honorable Legislature of the state at their last session; for the inestimable privilege of seeing even thus much of the labors of our representatives, the printers of Baltimore and their patrons, are indebted to the politeness and patriotism of a private hand.

As to the details of the several acts in question—they are not in our possession; however, if any of the favored few who may hold them, will favor us with those of an interesting nature, we would occasionally present them to our friends.---We suppose, however (as usual, under the present and former economical order of state affairs) it was intended by our constituted authorities, that the promulgation of their acts should be confided to magistrates and lawyers-and, indeed, as a convenience, a fee to the latter class of gentlemen, will, no doubt, put the sovereign people in possession of their " form and texture."

The events in Europe thicken with astonishing rapidity. The armies of France move with a celerity that baffles all opposition. The confederate forces are driven before them in consternation and dismay; and emperors and dukes betake themselves to flight as their only securicy. How must the English ministry appear on the assembling of parliament? What can they say, or what can they propose? The success of their navy is but a poor consolation for the victories obtained by .Bonaparte on the continent. What has become of the millions of dollars sent forward to feed and pay the subsidiary troops? what must the people of England say to such a profuse draining of their hard money! will the exchequer bills fill up the vacuum? What terms of peace must be expected after such incredible successes of the French? Bonaparte has declared he will not make peace without a guarantee for its permanent continuance. Who or what must become the pledge for this security How must the Russians curse the policy that has led them from their homes, to fall a sacrifice in this disastrous crusade? how will Austria rave with indignation, to find their country crowded with victorious troops, to eat up the scanty. leaving of their own armies! Where this resentment will fall, Gon only knows. Who are the men, and what the causes, of, this dreadful carnage, may become a serious enquiry! and how Britain will stand on this investigation, is a consideration highly interesting to that nation.

PLEASING.—We are happy to find that Mr. Monroe has been able to check the depredatory conduct of Britain on our commerce. The manufacturers of England (as we predicted) have been roused to prevent their own ruin, by remonstrating against those measures which had a tendency to draw forth a retaliating system from this country. The successes of England have always encreased their depredations on us. The new-fangled law of nations must be abandoned; which has been no more than an increase of insolence, as the British have increased in power. This law of nations, on the first forming of the coalition, was a total annihilation of our neutral commerce. Judge Scott then determined on our confiscated British property, and for other Loroperty as the prospects of Britain then good. It was then the COALITION LAW. After the taking of Ulm, then it was the ULM LAW; and we have reason to think, if the Judge has now relaxed, that it is now the VIENNA LAW! We hope the next law of nations, will be the PRACE Law, founded on principles subversive of wRule Bistania, rule the waves. Our feast of shells gentry may not be pleased with this law, it may be too humiliating to their old friends; but every real American must be pleased when Britain is-checked in her usurpation, and learns

to respect the rights of other nations.
