Two Dromedaries,

FROM ARABIA.

THESE are the first of the species ever imported into this country. The value of them is such, that the Arabian, possessed of his Dromedary, has nothing either to want or to fear. They will travel at the rate of a hundred miles in a day, 5 or 6 days together, without either eating or drinking. They are part like the horse, cow, sheep, and the rabbit, and are the most docile animal in the world. They kneel down, take on their load, and wait the pleasure of their keeper to rise. They arrive at their full growth at 6 years old, which is about 20 hands high, and live to the age of 40 or 50 years. The oldest of the above is forty years, and the youngest 17 months.

These astonishing Animals are to be seen at No. 36, opposite the lower Marsh-market. It is to be hoped the Ladies and Gentlemen of Baltimore will not lose this favourable opportunity which may be the only one (at least for many years) of viewing these surprising animals, so much spoken of by naturalists and Historians.
