NEW-YORK, Feb. 8. A friend has favored us with the following extract of a letter from Charleston, dated January 26: "The ship I mentioned to be off the Bar, from Liverpool, brings me letters to the 25th November -the brig Unanimity, captain Wilson, with her cargo, after a detention of 14 days was liber. t d. The king's Advocate had advised the captors to do it from the beginning, but they refused it at first .-Captain Wilson was in London, and expected to sail from Plymouth for Bilboa, about the 6th of December, being in want of new sails.

" N. B. The Unanimity was loaded with Caraccas Cocoa, and bound from Charle ston to Bilboa, but was detained and sent into Plymouth."
