It would seem, we must very often be indebted to Boston and sometimes Philadelphia prints for the great confidential occurrences, which are said to transpire at the seat of the general government; parzicularly if of a nature, the developement of which is unpleasant to the administration or its friends. As one proof in point, we copy from the Philadelphia Gazette, the following minute and lengthy list of interrogatories, which would seem to embrace information founded on a kind of negotiation said to have been secretly entered into between general Miranda on the one part, and the President and the Secretary of State on the other, relative to an expedition reported to have been fitted out at New-York, as noticed several days since in the American. The article we have reference to, we have reason to believe, bore an aspect as unpleasant as its authors could give it; and, as was intended, it called forth abuse of the administration from several quarters; but nothing has appeared so manifestly abandoned as the following " questions;"-calculated to convey a belief that the Leander was fitted out under the sanction of exccutive connivance, for hostile purposes, in an underhand way, and against a peaceful power.

But in presenting these wonderful cabinet seerets to our readers, we would first premise, that the authority is highly suspicious from whence their pretended disclosure proceeds. The Philadelphia Gazette, (from which we copy) in conjunction with the United States Gazette, have, for a length of time, proved the servile and willing mediums for the promulgation of the views of Spanish hostility against the interest of our government : indeed, it would corrupt terms of negociation, similar to those offered and refused by their brother editor, Spain; otherwise that he shall withdraw from Major Jackson. We know the Spanish Mar- the United States. quis is good at intrigue; and if he can bribe and corrupt lawyers—may he not have a chance to find fallibility among even printers, to bend them, to his evil designs? But be this as it may, we would only remark, that the papers in question, have ever been foremost in ushering to the world, and sometimes with seeming triumph, all the real and fabricated difficulties, which from time to time, have been made to casta gloom over our affairs with Spain. The Marquis's "Graviora Manent" and much unprincipled matter, intended to injure the purchase of Louisiana, &c. appeared under the auspices of these loyal and we might almost say Spanish official prints.

Some of the opposition prints state a belief, that the Marquis is the author of the subjoined -and it is evident, it seems characteristic of that malignancy, and crafty stratagem which he has heretofore put in play to injure the administration and its operations.

Did you observe to Miranda that Contress did not appear inclined to go to war Did Mirahda reply that if Government interfere about his preparations?

Did you answer him, after a long pause, that Government would shut their cessary caution so as not to commit

Did Miranda return immediately to N. York to make his preparations and act in consequence?

Is it possible, is it credible that if Miranda had not met from you with a kind of indirect encouragement he would immediately on his return from Washington have proceeded to expences that a little vigilance alone would have rendered

Is it credible, that without that indirect support, two officers of the Federal Government, at the port of New-York, could have engaged in such a nefarious proceeding?

Is it credible, that one of them would have permitted his eldest son to attend Gen. Miranda in this depredatory expedition in the capacity of his aid?

Is it true, that the Leander, in which this young man embarked, had on board many muskets, rifles, pikes, field pieces, howitzers, ammunition of all kinds, regimentals, two printing-presses, with ten or welve journeymen printers?

Is it true, that this vessel remained in port a fertnight after clearing out at the custom-house, to embark recruits, and that the objects of her delay were generally known at New-York?

Is it to be supposed, that if the admihistration had even not had any previous information of the scheme, they could be ignorant of these transactions, known to every body else ?- Even admitting for supposition sake, that they had not a previous knowledge, would not their supposed ignorance be a glaring proof of the most criminal neglect?

Has not the honour and neutrality of our country been committed in the most scandalous manner by an hostile armament fitted out in our ports under the eyes of fublic officers, consisting of American ships under the American fl. g, with American crews, American volunteers, American arms, and many other American implements of war, with the object of attacking the colonies of a nation with whom we are at ficace?

Are not all these circu:nstances together, sufficiently weighty to influence the Spanish commanders, it Miranda's attempt takes place, to lay an embargo on all American property within their juris-

Will not the innocent merchant of the U. S. be exposed to the most ruinous and disastrous consequences if an event of this nature should take place?

And should they not consider either a criminal connivance or a not less culpable neglect on the part of those through whose authority such scandalous proceed. ings could have been checked and prevented as the true causes of their misfor-

These questions are made by every body, and we must confess that daily circumstances occur vhich in our opinion render a satisfactory answer more and more difficult. We submit them to the public, as immediately interested in the clearing up of a mystery which appears to hang over this affair, and which seriously threatens the interest of our fellowciuzens.
