A man from Pittsburg, with a keel boat, loaded with flour, who irrived here about 10 days since, finds great diffigulty in selling it; the price ab ut 9 to 10 dollars. Baltimore and Philadelphia flour arrives almost daily and commands 12 and 12 1-2 deli :rs."

Extract of a letter from a gentleman in New-Orleans, dated Dec. 18th, 1805.

" Pork and beef, the form r there is not a barrel at present in market for sale. t would bring from 14 to 16 dallars, but hese p ices will soon b. reduced by arrials from the northward, and not more an 10 or 12 dollars should be calculated upon-beet is a less safe article to deal in, the demand for it is not so great, and it is more difficult to preserve through our warm_summers; general price from 5 to 10 dolls. great attention should be aid in putting up these articles in well made barrels, made of well seasoned wood, and to have them here early in the season. Hemp would be an article of considerable importance if att.nded to by the western people; good clean hemp brought to this market in good condition would always command from 7 to 8 dollars per 100 lb. Flour should be sent here merely sufficient for the consumption of the coun ry, it is exposed to too much heat and moisture ever to be exported to foeign markets to advantage, the price the pproaching season will be, I presume, rom 5 to 8 dollars. Coin meal is still a more dangerous article of commerce t an flour, it is equally liable to perish, and the expenses on so smail a value, tooften I fear consumes the whole amount of sales. Lard to suit this market should be put up in kegs of from 50 to 100 lb. full hooped and the i.cads whitewashed, would bring, put up in this way, one or two cents per lb. more than when in large carrels and be much readier sale, average price 12 1-2 cents. Pot and Pearl usher re articles that could certainly be made to great advantage in the western country, I observe that the general prices in New York, are from 150 to 160 dollars per ton, and I see no reason why, if of equal equality, it should not bring the same price here.
