FROM THE RICHMOND ENQUIRER.

AARON BURR, Ex-Vice-President of the United States, arrived in this city the evening before the last, and left it yesterday morning, in the stage. Instead of those flattering at. tentions, which once accompanied the motions of Mr. Bury; which told whilst yet at a digtance, that he was coming, and spoke to him when he arrived, a most affectionate welcome. he now moves through our towns and villages, an unknown and neglected stranger. Unlike Sterne's Yorick, no "labor stands still as he passes along, no bucket hangs suspended in the middle of the well, no spinning-wheel forgets its round," no attendant of the inn waits with eager and impatient curiosity to examine him, who was once the second officer in the union. A sew weeks since Mr. Burr passed through this city on his way to the south; no one expected his arrival; few-knew of his departure. Why this sudden change in the feelings of the people? It is not because the revolution of the wheel of fortune has brought Mr. Burr to the ground; it is not that he who was once the Vice-President of the union, has sunk down into the obscurity of a private station, but because such will always be the reward of men, who are supposed to have apostatised from their principles, in a country where the people are enlightened enough to distinguisli merit, and virtuous enough to honor it. In this country the people " may be wrong in their opinions, in their sentiments never."

As to ourselves, Mr. Burr might have continued to pass to and fro through our city in the same silent disregard, which we have lately entertained towards him, perhaps in too high a degree; but for a supposition, which gives him once more the air and importance of a public character. Why is it that at this time when the parties of New York are assuming a new arrangement, which gives to the friends of Mr. Burr an increase of numbers and of force, does this gentleman so suddenly go back upon his own footsteps and return to the north ! It was impossible, that these two events, so contiguous in point of time and so seemingly connected in their objects, should not have connected themselves in our minds ! and given birth to a suspicion, which it becomes our duty to develope. It is only by peeping through such narrow "loopholes" that we shall be ever able to catch a glimpse at the designs of such politicians, as work in | ler of Europe. Perfidious councils, by the dark. Conjecture must supply the place of fact; though facts may often contradict the omjecture.

New York is now divided into four distinct political parties : the Federalists, the Burrites, the Clintonians, and the Livingstonians. The brig having gone to pieces, the captain went to the large boat with nine of the crew and passengers, and the mate with a similar number to the small boat, these made what endeavors they could to reach the Island of Jamaica; but having drifted to leeward, they found themselves happy enough after remaining six days at sea to make the Island called Great Caimans, when they were taken next day on board the schr. Matilda bound to Charleston. The captain and people in the large boat have not yet been heard of. The above particulars are extracted from a letter wrote by one of the passengers off Havanna, on board the said schr. on the 5th ultimo to a friend of his in this city, and has been received by the ship Holland, which gave them a supply of water on that day.

### EXTRAORDINARY WOMAN.

The Paris papers recount prodigies of a woman in the neighbourhood of Lyons. The circumstances of her case have confounded the philosophers, and left her no credit with men unaccustomed to schenific reasoning. Learning hesitates, because it wants principles to explain;-Ignorance decides at once, because it knows not the variety of undiscovered principles which exist.

The case of this woman is, that of a confussion of all senses-of seeing, smelling, hearing, touching, tasting. The quality of one sense seems transferred to another; there is a kind of organic confusion and substitution; the eyes, do duty for the ears, the taste for the eyes, and touch for the taste.

A very learned physician, a writer in the Journal de Sante, gives an account of

having visited this woman at Lyons: "To believe in apparent impossibilities (he says) is often the necessity of men of science; but it is there good fortune likewise to discover that the world contain many more miracles than is first imagined, and that nothing is imposible, as referred to the Omnipotence of the Deity, and that impossibilities are much rarer in the combinations of human life than

the vanity of science will acknowledge. "This woman, whom I visited, and to whom I presented several sorts of medicines, powders, simples, compounds, & many other substances, which I am convinced she never saw before, told me their several tastes, as nesrly, and with as much precision, as taste could pronounce. She described them, indeed, with astonishing exactness, and frequently when my own palate was confounded.

"Her eyes were next bound with a thick bandage, and I drew from my pocket several sorts of silk ribbands. All these that differ in the original colours she immediately told me. It was in vain to attempt puzzling her: she made no mistake; she passed the ribbond merely thro' her hand and immediately decided on its peculiar colour. She could, in fact, discover the quality of any thing by the touch or taste, as accurately as I could do with my eyes.

"The organs of hearing were then closed, as well as the contrivance of stuffing the cars would answer the purpose. I then commenced a conversation with a friend in the apartment, and spoke in an almost inaudible whisper. She repeated, with great power of memory, every word of the conversation. In short, I came away a convert; in other words, I believed what I had seen. A philosopher knows the fallibility of the senses; but he should know likewise that science ought not to reject because it cannot have demonstration. We must admit miracles, and the power of miracles, or we must question almost all the appearances of nature. Ignorance doubts what if it choose, it may easily understand; science endeavours to comprehend, and when it cannot, it submits to the senses."
