City of Baltimore.

(By Authority.) [No. V.] AN ORDINANCE Making appropriation for filling up and wharving Conway street.

WHEREAS, by an act of the General Assembly of Maryland, passed at November session, 1796, the owners of lots binding and running with Camden, Conway, Barre and Lee-streets, were permitted to fill up and extend said lots to the line of the east side of Light-street and Forrest-street, and were then by directed to give notice to the special commissioners of Baltimore town, to make their choice or election to fill up and wharf said streets, otherwise the party binding thereon should be at liberty to fill up and wharf the same, and forever thereafter to enjoy all the rights and benefits of wharfrage at the end of said streets: BE it therefore enacted and ordained, by the mayor and city council of Baltimore, That the city commissioners be and they are hereby directed to fill up Conway-street to the line of the east side of Light-street and Forrest-street, and wharf the same in such manner as with the approbation of the mayor they may judge best, and that they draw on the register of the city for any sum not exceeding eight hundred dollars for the purpose aforesaid. A further Supplement to the Ordinance entitled an Ordinance regulating the sinking of wells and erecting and repairing pumps within the city of Baltimore.

BE it enacted and ordained by the mayor and city council of Baltimore, That each of the superintendants of pumps within the city of Baltimore, shall hereafter receive as a compensation for their services, the sum of three hundred dollars per annum; and that it shall be their duty to examine the pumps within their several districts once in each week, any thing in the original ordinance, or the several supplements thereto, to the contrary notwithstanding.

Be it enacted and ordained, That if any person shall clean, scale, or wash any fish, cloaths, or any other article or thing, which may be liable to create a nuisance, or render the street lane, or alley, near any of the public pumps in the city of Baltimore, foul and unclean, every person so offending, shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding five dollars for every such offence, the one half to the informer. Of the Medical & Chirurgical Faculty of Maryland—June, 1805. The following gentlemen were elected officers for the term of two years: President Dr. Philip Thomas. Secretary Dr. Nathaniel Potter. Treasurer Dr. Henry Wilkies. Examiners for the Western Shore, Drs. George Brown, C. A. Warfield, John Crawford, John Coulter, James Steuart, John B. Davidge, N. Potter. For the Eastern Shore, Drs. Ennald Martin, Tristram Thomas, S. T. Johnson, P. K. Noel, James M. Anderson, jun. Drs. Smyth, Smith, Chalmers, Owen, Thiele, and Alender, were elected additional censors for the city of Baltimore; and Dr. Morgan Brown was chosen to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Dr. Edward Warvel, of Kent. Drs. Martin and Potter were elected biennial orators.

Those gentlemen who were examined in 1805, and have not received their licenses, will please to apply to Dr. Martin at Easton, for the Eastern, and to the Secretary at Baltimore, for the Western Shore.—As all licentiates are of consequence members of the faculty, their names will be registered in the proceedings about to be published, but no license will be granted until the sum of ten dollars for each applicant shall have been paid.

The practitioners of physic and surgery in the state of Maryland, who have commenced the practice since the first Monday of June, 1799, are respectfully informed, that unless they have obtained a license from one of the boards, or have produced to them satisfactory testimonials of their qualifications, they are liable to prosecution by indictment, and to a fine of fifty dollars for each prescription for which they shall have received remuneration. They are moreover informed that each of them, whether graduate or licentiate, stands indebted to the faculty in the sum of ten dollars.

Those of the faculty who may not have received Dr. Davidge's oration, will please to apply to the author or the secretary for the copy to which each member is entitled.

The secretary has to regret that he cannot announce to the faculty the publication of Dr. Crawford's oration, though he can assure them they are flattered, with the expectation of receiving it previous to the first of June.

There will be a meeting of the board of examiners, for the Eastern Shore, at Easton, on the second Monday in April, and for the Western Shore, at Baltimore, on the first Monday in June; where all persons candidates for licenses to practise physic or surgery in the state of Maryland, are requested to attend. The secretary reiterates his admonition to the censors to be vigilant, lest the medical law be violated by unlicensed practitioners; and flatters himself they are sensible that all our efforts to promote the cause of science and humanity must prove unavailing, without the rigorous execution of their duty. The faculty will please to observe, that a digest of their proceedings will be comprised in a pamphlet, as soon as an accurate list of the members can be prepared; and that to this they are respectfully referred for all other matters appertaining to the institution. The secretary takes leave to apologise to the faculty for having deferred so long the annual report, and assures them that the impracticability of obtaining the necessary information has been the sole cause of the apparent inattention of the board. He also flatters himself, that from his experience in maritime pursuits, and his competence placed in him by many of the most respectable merchants in Baltimore, whilst following the sea-faring life, that he has a competent knowledge to keep his boats in good order, for the comfort and convenience of passengers, and that he shall merit the patronage of a generous public, which he hereby respectfully solicits.

It is unnecessary to make any comments on the advantages, which attend this route in preference, to that which would be taken of the Chesapeake Bay. This is a direct road through a beautiful level, and fertile country, from the Delaware state, to the best of government; whilst the other presents a rugged scene of bills and valleys, generally subject to water and mire. Travellers on this route will not only derive advantage from good roads shortening the distance, and incurring less expense, but will avoid the danger of losing their health, by not being exposed to travelling by night.
