for the city of Baltimore; and Dr. Morgan  
Brown was chosen to fill the vacancy occasioned  
by the death of Dr. Edmund Warvel, of Kent.  
Drs. Martin and Potter were elected biennial  
orators.

1805, and have not received their licenses, will

the Eastern, and to the secretary at Baltimore,  
for the Western Shore.—As all licentiates are  
of consequence members of the faculty, their

The practitioners of physic and surgery in  
the state of Maryland, who have commenced  
the practice since the first Monday of June,  
1799, are respectfully informed, that, unless  
they have obtained a license from one of the  
boards, or have produced to them satisfactory  
testimonials of their qualifications, they are  
liable to prosecution by indictment, and to a  
fine of fifty dollars for each prescription for  
which they shall have received remuneration.  
They are moreover informed that each of them,  
whether graduate or licentiate, stands indebted  
to the faculty in the sum of ten dollars.  
Those of the faculty who may not have re-  
ceived Dr. Davidge's oration, will please to ap-  
ply to the author or the secretary for the copy  
to which each member is entitled.  
The secretary has to regret that he cannot  
announce to the faculty the publication of Dr.  
Crawford's oration, though he can assure them  
they are flattered, with the expectation of re-  
ceiving it previous to the first of June.  
There will be a meeting of the board of ex-  
aminers, for the Eastern Shore, at Easton, on  
the second Monday in April; and for the West-  
ern Shore, at Baltimore, on the first Monday  
in June; where all persons candidates for li-  
censes to practise physic or surgery in the  
state of Maryland, are requested to attend.  
The secretary reiterates his admonition to  
the censors to be vigilant, lest the medical law  
be violated by unlicensed practitioners; and  
flatters himself they are sensible that all our  
efforts to promote the cause of science and  
humanity must prove unavailing, without the rig-  
orous execution of their duty.  
The faculty will please to observe, that a  
digest of their proceedings will be comprised  
in a pamphlet, as soon as an accurate list of the  
members can be procured; and that to this  
they are respectfully referred for all other mat-  
ters pertaining to the institution.

report, and assures them, that the imprac-

lowing places, viz:  
First, At Niagara, Detroit, Michilimacki-  
nac, Fort Wayne, Chicago, and at any place  
or places, where troops are or may be station-  
ed, marched, or recruited within the state of  
Ohio, and territory of Michigan, and at any  
place or places within the Indiana territory  
north of the 41st degree of north latitude.  
Second, At South-West Point, Tellico,  
Knoxville, Nashville, and within the Chero-  
kee nation between Tennessee and Georgia,  
and on the Tennessee river, and on the road  
between said river and Nashville, and at any  
place or places where troops are or may be  
stationed, marched or recruited within the  
states of Kentucky and Tennessee.  
Third, At the garrison near Vincennes on  
the river Wabash, at Fort Massac, New Ma-  
drid, Chickasaw Bluffs, Arkansas, Natches, and  
Fort Adams, and at any place or places where  
troops are or may be stationed, marched, or  
recruited in the Mississippi territory, except  
the county of Washington, and at any place or  
places in the Indiana territory south of the 41st  
degree of north latitude and fifty miles east  
of the Mississippi river.  
Fourth, At St. Louis, St. Charles, Kaskas-  
kia, Cahokia, and at any place or places,  
where troops are or may be stationed, marched  
or recruited within the territory of Louisiana  
north of New Madrid, and at any place or  
places in the Indiana territory within fifty  
miles east of the Mississippi river, and south  
of the 41st degree of north latitude, Fort Mas-  
sac excepted.  
Fifth, At New Orleans, Plaquemines, Point  
Coupee, Oacheta, Natchitoches, Applelousas,  
Attakapa, Fort Stoddert, Fort St. Stephens,  
and at any place or places where troops are or  
may be stationed, marched or recruited within  
the territory of Orleans, or in the county of  
Washington in the Mississippi territory, and  
at any place or places on the west side of the  
Mississippi river below Arkansas.  
Separate proposals will also be received as  
aforesaid for the supply of all rations, which  
may be required for the use of the United  
States, from the 1st day of January 1807, to  
the 31st day of December of the same year,

the state of Georgia, and on the Indian bound-

Seventh, At Charleston, Rocky Mount, on  
the head waters of the Santee, and at any place  
or places where troops are or may be station-  
ed, marched, or recruited, within the states of  
North and South Carolina.  
Eighth, At Norfolk, and at any place or  
places where troops are or may be stationed,  
marched or recruited, within the state of Vir-  
ginia.  
Ninth, At Fort M'Henry, and at any place  
or places, where troops are or may be stationed,  
marched, or recruited, within the state of  
Maryland and the district of Columbia.  
Tenth, At Fort Mifflin, Carlisle, and at any  
place or places, where troops are or may be  
stationed, marched, or recruited, within the  
state of Pennsylvania, east of the Mountains,  
and within the states of New Jersey, and Del-  
aware.  
Eleventh, At Pittsburg, and at any place or  
places, where troops are or may be stationed,  
marched, or recruited, within the state of  
Pennsylvania, west of the mountains.  
Twelfth, At Fort Jay, West Point, Albany,  
Shenectady, and at any place or places,  
where troops are or may be stationed, march-  
ed, or recruited, within the state of New  
York, Niagara and its dependencies excepted.  
Thirteenth, At Fort Trumbull, Fort Wol-  
cott, and at any place or places, where troops  
are or may be stationed, marched, or recruit-  
ed, within the states of Connecticut, Rhode  
Island and Vermont.  
Fourteenth, At Fort Independence, (Boston  
harbor) and at any place or places, where  
troops are or may be stationed, marched, or  
recruited, within the state of Massachusetts,  
the town of Springfield, and the district of  
Maine, excepted.  
Fifteenth, At Portsmouth, Portland, and at  
any place or places, where troops are or may  
be stationed, marched, or recruited within the  
state of New Hampshire and the district of  
Maine.  
Sixteenth, Proposals will also be received  
as aforesaid, for the supply of all rations,  
which may be required by the United States,  
for the troops, which are or may be stationed,  
marched, or recruited within the town of  
Springfield in the state of Massachusetts; and  
for the armories and other persons employed in  
the United States' army at that place, from  
the 1st day of January 1807 to the 31st day  
of December in the same year, both days inclu-  
sive.

A ration to consist of one pound and ten  
quarters of beef, or three quarters of a pound of  
pork, eighteen ounces of bread, or flour, one  
gill of rum, whiskey or brandy, and at the rate  
of two quarts of salt, four quarts of vinegar,  
four pounds of soap, and one pound and a half  
of candles, to every hundred rations. The  
prices of the several component parts of the  
ration shall be specified; but the United States  
reserve the right of making such alterations in  
the price of the component parts of the ration  
aforesaid, as shall make the price of each part  
thereof bear a just proportion to the proposed  
price of the whole ration. The rations are to be  
furnished in such quantities, that there shall at all  
times, during the term of the proposed contract,  
be sufficient for the consumption of the troops  
at Michilimackinac, Detroit & Chicago, for six  
months in advance; and at each of the other  
posts on the western waters, for at least three  
months in advance, of good and wholesome  
provisions, if the same shall be required. It is  
also to be permitted to all and every of the  
commandants of fortified places or posts, to  
call for, at seasons when the same can be trans-  
ported, or at any time in case of urgency, such  
supplies of like provisions in advance, as in the  
discretion of the commandant shall be deemed  
proper.  
It is understood that the contractor is to be  
at the expence and risk of issuing the supplies  
to the troops, and that all losses sustained by  
the deprivations of an enemy, or by means of  
the troops of the United States shall be paid by  
the United States at the price of the articles  
captured or destroyed as aforesaid on the depo-  
sition of two or more persons of creditable char-  
acters, and the certificate of a commissioned

sumed; and that a supply in advance may be  
always required at any of the fixed posts on the  
sea-board, or Indian frontier, not exceeding  
three months.
