From the attention ire have had time this day to bestow upon it, we are inclined to think that, both from the disposition of the President and the point he states to be in dispute, the matter may be amicably adjusted. It never can be pretended, nor do we believe is pretended, by this country, that we have a right to prevent neutrals carrying on all that commerce with enemies which we permit to ourselves during war. We cannot with justice accuse others of aiding the enemy if we do the very things ourselves which constitutes that aid. But it is probable, however, that the Americans will claim a much greater latitude of neutral commerce.

. "The president, in the present circumstances, recommends putting the coast in a state of defence, and preparing the public force by sea and land for action, if necessary.
