It will be read hereafter with avidity, when " War in Disguise" and its principles and the disaffiction of a Randolph will be held in detestation. When "War in Disguise" will rot neglected on the shelf, the nations of Europe will compliment the defence of neutral rights with translations, and resort to and respect it as a valuable authority.

A wort useful and respectable class of citizens is loaded with the foulest opprobrium, the fair commerce of our country pronounced a fraidulent protection-of belligerent property, under our neutral flag; and the unwarrantable spoliations committed upon it, by virtue of orders of the British councils, justified and approbated to an extent unworthy even of an Englishman Ne sutor ultra crefitam, says the gentleman. He has not stuck to his American last, and has this day exhibited the deplorable effects of over-heated irrascibility.
