

NEW-YORK, April 8.

Arrived yesterday as far as the Narrows, the British Packet Diana, Capt. Gibbons, in 49 days from Falmouth, England with the February Mail.

Our correspondent at Kingston, under date of the 17th inst. says: "Admiral Duckworth's squadron sailed from Kingston on the 10th inst. with the prizes ships, Jupiter, &c. for England."

We have been favored with a letter from the captain of one of the Jamaica fleet, bound to Halifax, dated March 24, in lat. 27, 45, long. 73, which mentions that the commodore of the fleet had just hailed him, and informed that the day before he gave chase to a large ship, which he supposed to be a French line of battle."

The editors of this Gazette have received Mo tege Bay papers to the 10th inst. from which they copy the following articles:

Kingston, March 8.—The Arcata, frigate of 40 guns, capt. Dunn, which sailed on Monday morning, with Vice Admiral Duckworth, for the station off Cadix, came to anchor off the Barbadoes opposite to this city on Saturday evening, with 1800 soldiers from Sir John to Vice Admiral Duane's squadron, which she had spoken the veteran, of 61 guns which he had taken in with proceeding for Port Royal, with intelligence that six French ships of the line had arrived at Porto Cavallo. The Arcata weighed anchor about half past 2 o'clock on Sunday last, and stood to the eastward with a favorable wind, for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of the information, which was furnished by the veteran, and the report of the L.G. vessel which arrived here on the 4th inst.

The ship of 74 guns capt. Keats, bearing the flag of Vice Admiral Duckworth, returned to Port Royal on Sunday afternoon, for the purpose of having the copper on the bows repaired.

Capt. Lloyd, from Nassau, states that the two French frigates, the Corvo, which escaped from the action of the 6th ult. went through the Crooked Island passage on Sunday morning, without showing any colors.

We are informed that the real object of the voyage of the capture which was lately sent hither from Santo Domingo, by Rear Admiral Lesseguis, was to procure from the officers of his squadron 2500 men were captured and are now prisoners of war, their attachment to his brave and gallantry in the late action, which they one and all refused to comply with, on account of his manifest cowardice.

The ostensible purpose of her mission was to solicit from the Commander in chief permission for Lesseguis to return to Europe without molestation, which, we need not hesitate to say, must have also been desired in it.

We understand that early in the ensuing week, Rear Admiral Duckworth will leave Port Royal, to the Sup. B. to resume his station off Cadix, and the Rear Admiral Louis will sail for Great Britain, with the remainder of the squadron and the prizes.

Affairs with England.—It is, we presume to the fortunate event of the change in the British ministry, that we are to attribute the delay that has taken place in adopting measures of defence against the outrages of English cruizers: for as yet no step has been taken on the subject. The bill, introduced by Mr. Nicholson, and adopted by the house, has not yet been acted upon by the senate—a committee appointed to consider it, have recommended amendments, considerably reducing the number of articles, to be prohibited. This is all that has been done, and it is a matter of satisfaction, if our hopes shall be realized, but to be regretted if no accommodation should take place.

Captain West, of the ship Darby, from Canton, arrived at Boston, states that the ship Achabalpa in June last, on the N. W. coast, was attacked by the natives, an obstinate contest ensued, in which capt. Potter, and nine others were killed, and nine wounded: they defended themselves with great bravery, and with great difficulty brought the ship off. Among the killed were both mates of the ship, and Mr. Layman Phinney, of Salem, nephew to the owner of the ship, who was on board as clerk—capt. Porter, a very worthy and promising young man. Near fifty of the natives were killed or died of their wounds.

A letter from Canton, received by the Mandarin, says—"Perhaps it is a premature affliction, by your giving notice, that two of the crew of the late ship Boston, captured at Nootka, were living with the natives at that place, in September 1804. If my memory serves me, one is named Thompson, the other Jewitt Rogers. I believe belong to Boston—the former, I understand, is the son of a boat builder, living at the north part of the town. Every other person on board the ship was massacred. The above-mentioned were badly wounded in the attack; but after

the natives got possession of the ship, and learnt those two were mechanics, they were spared—shortly after they recovered. This may be relied on."

The House of Representatives were on Monday almost exclusively occupied in discussing Mr. J. Randolph's motion to print the message of the President of the 6th December, which was the basis of the measures taken relative to Spain.

At an early hour of the day when this subject was called up, Mr. Blackleg moved that the galleries should be cleared. The house continued in secret sitting for a short time, when the doors were opened and the question taken by yeas and nays on the point of order, whether the decision of the Speaker was correct, viz.

"That the said message being contained in the journal of the secret proceedings of the House, as the same had been read in the House, it was now in order to call for the printing of the said message."

Yeas 43.—Nays 59. The question then recurred on the motion made by Mr. J. Randolph on Saturday as follows:

"That the printed supplemental journal of secret proceedings be amended, by inserting after the word 'read' in the third line of the first page, the message of the President of the United States of the 6th December last, and that a new edition of the said journal, thus amended, be printed for the use of the members."

On this motion a very interesting debate ensued, in which a pretty full view was taken by different speakers of the arguments urged in secret debate. Messrs. J. Randolph, Dana, J. C. Clark, P. P. Fish, G. W. Campbell & Jackson opposed the motion. As we shall give this debate with the utmost dispatch, we shall not at present attempt even an outline of it.

About 5 o'clock the Yeas and Nays were taken on the motion, which was disagreed to. Yeas 44.—Nays 74. On Tuesday, a motion was made by Mr. J. Randolph to print the letter addressed to, and the report received from the Secretary of War, which is referred to in the report of the select committee on Spanish affairs—which was disagreed to. Yeas 43.

AN ACT To extend jurisdiction in certain cases to state judges and state courts.

BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the respective county courts within, or next adjoining the revenue districts herein after mentioned, shall be, and are hereby authorised to take cognizance of all complaints and prosecutions for fines, penalties, and forfeitures, arising under the revenue laws of the United States, in the Districts of Champlain, Sacket Harbor, Oswego, Genesee, Niagara & Buffalo Creek in the state of New-York, and in the district of Presque Isle, in the state of Pennsylvania, and the district attorneys of New-York and Pennsylvania respectively, are hereby authorised and directed to appoint by warrant an attorney as their substitute or deputy, respectively,

to prosecute for the United States in each of the said county courts, who shall be sworn or affirmed to the faithful execution of his duty, as prosecutor aforesaid: Provided, that this authority shall not be construed to extend jurisdiction to the county courts aforesaid, over any civil cause, which may arise in any of those revenue districts, for the collection of duties payable to the United States; or of bonds or securities given for the security and payment of duties to the United States.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the county courts aforesaid, or the first judge of each of said courts, shall be, and hereby are further authorised to exercise all and every power in the cases of a criminal nature cognizable before them by virtue of the first section of this act, for the purpose of obtaining a mitigation or remission of any fine, penalty, or forfeiture, which may be exercised by the judges of the district courts, in cases depending before them by virtue of the law of the United States, passed on the 3d of March, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven, entitled 'an act to provide for mitigating or remitting the forfeitures, penalties, and disabilities, accruing in certain cases therein mentioned.' And in the exercise of the authority, by this section given to said county courts, or to the first judges thereof, they shall be governed in every respect by the regulations, restrictions, and provisions of the law of the United States passed on the third of March, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven, aforesaid; with this difference only, that instead of notifying the district attorneys, respectively, said county courts, or the first judges thereof as the case may be, shall before exercising said authorities, cause reasonable notice to be given to the attorney who may have been appointed and sworn or affirmed to prosecute for the United States in such court, that he may have an opportunity of showing cause against the mitigation or remission of such fine, penalty, or forfeiture.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That this act shall remain in force during the term of one year from its passage, and from thence to the end of the next session of congress thereafter, and no longer. AN ACT Declaring the town of Jersey, in the state of New-Jersey, to be a port of delivery; and for erecting a light-house on Wood Island, or Fletcher's-neck, in the state of Massachusetts.

BE it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the town or landing place of Jersey, in the state of New-Jersey, shall be a port of delivery, to be annexed to the district of Perth Amboy, and shall be subject to the same regulations and restrictions as other ports of delivery in the United States. And there shall be appointed a surveyor to reside at the said port of delivery, who shall be entitled to receive, in addition to the other emoluments allowed by law, a salary of one hundred dollars annually.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the secretary of the treasury shall be, and he is hereby authorised and required, to cause a good and sufficient light house to be erected on Wood-Island, or on Fletcher's-neck, in the district of Maine (selecting either place, as the President of the United States may deem most eligible) and appoint a keeper, and otherwise provide for such light-house, at the expense of the United States: Provided, that sufficient land for the accommodation of such light-house can be obtained at a reasonable price, and the Legislature of Massachusetts shall cede the jurisdiction over the same to the United States. And the sum of five thousand dollars is hereby appropriated for the erection of said light-house, to be paid out of any monies in the treasury, not otherwise appropriated.
