He was asked respecting the other note, and he acknowledged he had presented it. An officer was sent for, and he was taken before a magistrate. The editor was present when the first note was presented, which, without the least hesitation, he declared he had written entire : and we learn he made the same acknowledgment as to the other notes and check .---The penmanship is handsomely executed, and the names are considered complete imitations.
