Five Hundred Dollars Reward.

FLED from the City of Baltimore, on Tues-
day night, the 18th of March last, **GE-**
RARD VON HARTEN, a merchant, and

cent in speaking English, which he articulates

suredly through Virginia, collecting his debts
in Fredericksburg, Richmond and other parts
of the state, and about the first of April was
seen at Stanton, near which place he is sup-
posed to be at present. Any person apprehend-
