

The prosecution of the editor and printer of this paper for an alleged libel in Julius Denning, commonly called the row-bar case, after a second trial, has ended in the imprisonment of the defendants.

Extract of a letter from the Post-Master, at Athens, Georgia, to the Post-Master in New-Orleans, dated January 27th, 1846.
