The supercargo of the ship Good Friends, arrived at Philadelphia, in 76 days from the Isle of France and Bourbon, furnishes the following marine intelligence:

"The Good Friends left St. Paul's, Bourbon, the 6th February; the day previous, a dispatch boat arrived at St. Denis, with an account of one of the English frigates cruising off the Isle of France, having lost all her masts and being obliged to throw her guns overboard in a gale of wind; it was reported that an American ship had towed her away. March 29, in lat. 12, N. long. 42, W. was boarded by captain Little, commander of the private armed ship Ainsley, of about 150 tons, carrying 16 guns and 40 men, under English colors, said to be fitted out at Liverpool to cruise off that station for homeward bound India ships, sailing under the flag of the United States, but were well known to be French property or laden with such. Captain Little had a list of all the American vessels that had been at the Isle of France the last year, with the names (as he said) of the real and nominal owners of each; he mentioned several vessels which he was very desirous to fall in with, coming from the Isle of France. About five weeks previous to boarding the Good Friends, captain Little informed he had boarded the ship George Washington, of Salem, and had ordered her for Liverpool. He also informed that a short time before he had ordered another vessel under the flag of the U. S. to the same place, but declined giving her name. The officers were very scrupulous in examining the Good Friend's papers: Captain L. demanded the instructions of the owner to the supercargo, and opened a number of letters: the mate and seamen were taken on board the Ainsley, and detained 24 hours. Lat. 24, 43, N. long. 71 1-2, W. saw the wreck of a schooner, about 80 or 90 tons, her foremast gone, her quarter deck and plank clear off, with yellow sides & mouldings, could not discern the name, but thinks from appearance, she had not been many days at sea.

Brig Eliza, Webb, 33 days from Maracaibo. Left the schooner Nimrod, of Baltimore. Schooner Mary, Giddings, of Boston, 20 days from Demerara. Left a schooner for Baltimore in 10 days. April 12, in lat. 12, long. 69, spoke the schooner Emeline, 16 days from Turk's Islands. A barque from Demerara for Portland, had been sent into Grenada, by a British ship of war, an American brig, and a schooner, (supposed to be the Hunter, of Boston) from thence, sent into ditto. Arrived, brig Sally, Foster, from New Orleans. Left there, March 15, the ship Charles, Butler, of Baltimore. Also, schooner Betsey, Smith, 16 days from Cayenne, where she was detained 16 days by an embargo. Left there, the schooner Good Intent, Bellet, for Baltimore, in 10 or 12 days. Ship Diana, Cannon, of Alexandria, bound to Liverpool. Also, ship Fortune, Easton, from City of St. Domingo. Left there, April 1, the ship Apollo, for Baltimore, in 9
