

cient in the last legal act of this important election; for voting is evidently no purpose, if the official returns are not made in due season. We hope and trust therefore, that immediate and effective measures will be taken to have them forwarded to the secretary's office by the 10th of May, which is the time pointed out by the Constitution.

THE result of the recent election for governor, &c. in this commonwealth, whether it terminate in the election of both the Republican candidates, or of the lieutenant governor only, will prove to the world, that "old Massachusetts" is in a very rapid retrograde march to the ground that she took at the commencement of our glorious revolution. Even Boston, the "head quarters of good principles," seems this year in a degree to have wiped off the disgrace which for some time has been attached to it, from its being governed by an *anglo-monarchical British faction*. The principal towns in the state have done well, but Boston comparatively speaking, has this year exceeded them all. [Boston paper.]

Arnold, 1187  
Smith, 984—503 rep. maj.

There being no choice by the people, it now remains with the legislature to elect one of the three candidates.

By captain Warden we learn that the brig Tranquebar capt. —, of this port near the island of Sumatra, took fire and was entirely consumed, with all the people, except the supercargo, Mr. Coates of this city and one other person who fortunately escaped.

Yesterday arrived brig Nancy, captain Higgins, from Trinidad, which place he left the 3d April and informs us, that it was reported by two vessels from the Spanish Maine, that Miranda with his squadron was arrived and had landed at Margareta of which place he had taken possession, that he was joined by 5000 of the inhabitants, that he was proceeding to Carracas, and that the Spaniards were joining him from all quarters. This was the report and as such captain H. gives it; but, as Miranda was left at Jacquemel the 24th of March, it is hardly probable that he could have arrived on the Maine in time for the news to get to Trinidad on the 1st of April, which was the time captain H. heard it. The same story is told as being received at Martinico in the hearing of Captain Sherman from thence, previous to the 8th of April.

From the above accounts & some others that we have heard, it is not improbable, that the insurgents of that country, being well informed of Miranda's movements, had flew to arms and taken possession of some posts which gave rise to Miranda's having landed. The several Spaniards whom capt. H. saw at Trinidad seemed pleased with the idea of Miranda's landing and seem to think he would succeed. Phil. pap.

Captain Francis, while at Bordeaux, received the following letter from Capt. Perkin Salter, dated

"Rochfort, Feb. 11, 1806.

"SIR, I have taken the Liberty to inform you of our situation at present and our distresses since we left America.—I was from New York, where I at present belong, having command of the brig Minerva, bound to Bordeaux—I was taken in the bay, within two days sail of Bordeaux, and burned, vessel and cargo besides losing all my clothes.—Was on board of the French squadron 4 months, in a most deplorable situation.—For me to give you a particular detail, it would take a quite of paper. I can only say, if they had burned me with the brig, it would not have been much worse. The other Captains, J. Tuck, jun. of Manchester, captain Solomon Pitnick, of N. York, and your friend and fellow townsman, captain Francis Sargent, who departed this life on the 9th Feb. at the Hospital marine at Rochfort, have all been treated the same. We are still in a bad situation. From what we can learn, they do not mean to pay us any thing, and expect soon to be liberated to seek a passage to America, after being so barbarously treated."
