From the NATIONAL INTELLIGENCER.

REMARKS On the measures of the last session of Congress. [CONCLUDED.]

IV. France has been represented as having threatened us with war in case we engaged in hostilities with Spain; and this allegation is set forth in the shape of an argument against any further negociation with Spain, which it is contended, would, under such circumstances, be in the highest degree humiliatie g. Under what circumstances the alleged threat was made, or whether it was unqualified, we are not informed. We have, however, no hesitation in averring that no such threat has been made by France, and in saying that what has been distorted into a threat was nothing more than a candid answer of the French government to an application from ourselves, as to what she might do, in case of a war between the United States and Spain; which we knew before as necessarily resulting from her treaty with Spain. By that treaty we find, after laying down, generally, the assistance which each government shall have a right to demand from the other, the following conclusive stipulation, which is so applicable as to seem to have been provided for the present case.

"The required power shall likewise furnish, on the demand of the requiring power, within the term of three months from the requisition, eighteen thousand infantry, and six thousand cavalry, with a proportionable train of artillery, to be employed solely in Europe, or in defence of the colonies, which the contracting

powers possess in the gulf of Mexico." When then the question was put to the minister of France, if the United States go to war with Spain, what part will you take, what other reply could be make, than that a war with the one power would produce a war with both. It was a question which need not have been asked; but being put, the answer given so far from being a threat, was the only answer which could, with sincerity, have been rendered. It announced the truth, and nothing but the truth, in a style neither arrogant nor offensive.

V. A distinguished member of the executive government has been charged with having made an application to the Secretary of the Treasury for money to aid in the negociation for the purchase of the Floridas, previous to any appropriation having been made for this purpose by Congress.

This is indeed a serious charge. Were it true, it would have become the representatives of the people, the guardi ns of the national treasure, to have instituted a rigid enquiry. We will not undertak it would not be the duty of the executive to lay his hand, without a legislative sanction, on every dollar in the treasury Such cases not only may exist; but actually have occurred. They are, however, such as involve the dearest interests of the country, and they can only spring from those great and critical emergencies in which deep and impenting evils are ready, unless averted by immediate and ecisive measures, to burst with destuclive fury on communities. No one will pretend to say that the Flo ida purchase was of this description. But is the charge true? Let any man read the following xtracts from the journals of the House of Representatives, and judge for him-

The charge was made—when Mr Jackson offered the following resolution, which was agreed to:

Resolved, That the secretary of the treasury be requested to communicate to this House any information which he may possess in relation to an application said to have been made to draw money f om the treasury for the purchase of the florid s before an appropriation made by law for that purpose.

A few d.ys afterwards the following letter was received from the secretary of the treasury:

· Treasury Department, April 15, 1806. .

In answer to the request contained in the resolution of the House of Representatives of the 8th instant, I have the honor respectfully to state, that " no application has been made to draw money from the treasury for the purchase of the Floridas before an appropriation made by law for that purpose.

The circumstances, which may have produced an impression that such an application had been made, being unconnected with any matter pertaining to the duties of the office of the secretary of the treasury, are not presumed tocome within the scope of the information required from this department by the House.

LATE FOREIGN NEWS. From London and Liverpool papers received at the Office of the Daily Advertiser, N. York.

> LONDON, March 17. IRISH CATHOLICS.

On the 9th instant, a most numerous and highly respectable body of the Roman Catholic Inhabitants of Ireland assembled at Darcy's ta. vern, in the Metropolis of that country; and it is with the most heartfelt satisfaction we can state, that the utmost harmony, unanimity, and good temper governed the meeting.

The Right Hon. Lord Southwell took the chair. The question proposed was expressive of the highest confidence and reliance in the integrity, wisdom, and patriotism of the present administration. This sentiment was universally applauded.-Every man present reprehended the idea of pressing the Catholic Claims at the pres nt moment, as being at once inexpedient, untimely and unwise; at the same time that the unauthorized and intrusive communication on this subject made by some meddling and wrong headed individuals to Mr. Fox, was universally reprobated. Some slight difference in opinion prevailing,

whether any specific declaration should or should not be drawn up in the spirit of the above disposition, it was deemed adviseable to adjourn the M. eting to the following Thursday, when there is little doubt but the Resolutions to that effect were adopted.

We repeat, it is with the most heartfelt satisfaction that we lay before our readers the result of this Meeting, which we cannot but consider, in the present awful moment, the best and most impo tant news we could have communicated. It contains the assurance of the affectionate support of three millions of people in the dreadful contest in which we are engaged, nor have the Catholics, by taking this noble line of conduct, served themselves less than they have the Empire They must henceforward be considered with that affection, respert and gratitu e by Great Britain, of which we endeavored to prove them worthy, when their claims were under the consideration of Parliament, last session.

HOUSE OF COMMONS. As the honorable gentlemen had not particularized these quarters, it was impossible for him to give any answer with reference to them. The hon gentleman had also alluded to rumours o the acquiescence of the catholic body in the change of sentiments, which he stated to have taken place in certain quarters. Of the determinations of that body, he thought it would be more natural to expect information from the hon, gentleman himself.—He did not feel himself called upon to ay any thing more on the subject on this occasion

Jan. 25 .- On the 22d inst. the French Charge d'Affaires, M. Ruffin, received a courier from the minister M. 'Talleyrand, in the person of Secretary Le Reux, who brought a copy of the peace of Presburg. upon which the Charge d'Affaires applied for an audience of the Reis Effen ii, which he recei ed yesterday. At this audience M. Ruffin not only delivered this treaty, but also a particular letter from the Minister of State M., Talleyrand in which the advantages are stated which may hereafter accrue to the Porte, from her becoming a neighbour of the Emperor of France and King of Italy by a cession of Venetian Dalmatia to France, by Anstria. M. Ruffin afterwards communicated the treaty of peace to all the Foreign Ministers.
