LATEST FROM EUROPE. By the Packet, Capt. TROTT, from Liverpool, we have our files of London papers, continued to the 23d March. It appears, from them, that dispatches had been received from France, by a flag of truce, on which a Cabinet Council was immediately held. They were un terstood to have come from M. Talleyrun I, addressed to Mr. Fox. There was also a dispatch brought over in the same flag of truce, to Baron Jacobi, the Prussian Minister. Both these disputches were enclosed in a letter from the commandant of Boulogne to Lord K-ith, requesting his Lordship to forward them immediately. These particulars are stated in our papers of the latest dates; at which time nothing further had transpired on the subject.

The Expose of the state of the French. Empire, had been received in England. It is au elaborate work, and embraces a wide and extensive field of political speculation. The terms upon which England may obtain Peace, are, when fully considered, nothing less than an equality of maritime strength-France, at the same time, to retain every acquisition she has made on the continent of Europe. While this language is held out to England, the Expose, enumerates Holland as one of the federative parts of the "Grand Empire." not merely as an allied power with France, but as incorporated with that kingdom. The intention too, of revolutionizing the Turkish provinces is openly avowed. After these pacific declarations, the Ex-London, in Mariland hone goes on to state the improvements making in the French ports; -it observes :--

" If you cast your eyes on our ports,

you will see that exertions are making on both seas, to render them more accessidrawback; 229 small boxes fresh Prunes, in ble, more commodious, and more secure. Basins are digging at Antwerp; sluices and canals are forming at Antwerp, Dieppe, Ostend, Dunkirk, and Havre. At Honfleur, Bordeaux, Nice. Huli: guen, Belleisle, Ajaccio, and Bastia; quays are constructed, and jetties or moles lengthened or rebuilt. All these different kinds of works are carrying on at Rochelle. The cleansing of the ports of Cette and Marseilles is continued, and that of Ole-20 cases fruit in Brandy; 30 boxes Cordials; ron is enlarging. The ports of Dielette and Casteret are prepared in such a manner as to be capable of receiving a great number of vessels and gun-boats, which will alarm the inhabitants of the English islands of Jersey and Guernsey, as those at Boulogne menace Dover and London: The soundings taken at Bruchave afforded satisfactory results; the Rhone will ' have a port. Engineers have examined what improvements it is possible to make in that of Genoa. Six millions eight hundred and fifty thousand francs have been expended on the military ports. This sum has been principally applied in the excavations, the jetties of the mole, the construction of the outer port and basin, and the foundation of the new port, Buonaparte, which, destined to complete this beautiful maritime creation, and worthy of his name, will be, on the channel, the terror of England; at Boulogne, the basin and the sluice, the completion of the works which constitutes the whole of the port, and the construction of the establishments by which it is surrounded; at Ambleteure, the works necessary for deepening the port, the elevation of the jetty, which protects it from the sand driven against it by the west winds, the linewalls, and the buildings; at Brest, the formation of an artificial island, the excarations in the rock, the hospitals, the magazines, the arsenal, the harracks, and the completion of the batteries; at Antwerp, the continuation of the rapid works which are to form the arsenal of our marine on the North Sea, the erection of quays and work shops; in the road of Rochefort, the jetties on which Fort Bayard is to be erected, and the operations of every kind required by this difficult construction."

Letters from London assure us, that the most friendly intercourse subsists between the American Minister in England, and the government of that country; and that no doubts were entertained of an immediate adjustment of our differences, on such fair and equitable principles, as would bind the two nations in still stronger bonds of amity and friendship. BRITISH PRIZE COURTS.

9th March, 63f. 45c.

Privy Council Chumber, March 11, 1806. CASE OF THE WILLIAM, TREFRY, MASTER. Present, Earl Fitzwilliam, Lord President, Duke of Montross, Lord Auckland, Master of the Rolls, Sir William Wynne, and Sir William Scott -The case decided in this court was a appeal by an American claimant, from a sentence of the court of Vice Admiralty of Halifax: It was tried by a full Court, and the judgment unanimous, for condemning the property as lawful prize. It was briefly stated by Sir William Grant, master of the Rolls, " That the single question in this case is, whether the voyage in which the property of the claimant was embarked at the time of the capture was a lawful voyage. The cargo in question consisted of cocoa, which had been shipped at Laguira, a port in the Spanish province of Carraccas, in South America, on account of the claimant, in the same ship in which it was now captured, and was brought to Marblehead, a port of the United States, where it was entered and landed, a bond having been given as usual for the duties; but it was a few days afterwards re-shipped in the same bottom, and dispatched on a voyage to Bilboa. Debentures were thereupon granted to the claimant for the amount of the duties, a small part excepted; and these debentures being, at a subsequent period, given up at the Custom House, and the small balance of duties paid in cash, the bond given, on the
