We learn, from a gentleman who arrived in this city a day or two ago, from St. Domingo, that, at the time of his departure there were very general movements among the subjects of the black emperor Dessalines .- What the actual cause of this was he did not understand, but it was said that some advices had been received by way of Junaica, that taught the blacks to expect a specily attack. The consequences of these advices were, that Dessalines was putting the black army into an active organization for war; all the money, valuable property and goods were removed to the mountainous country in the interior, and all the white inhabitants were ordered to remove from the sea coast.

During the recent celebration of some fete a French family had made its escape from the Cape, but being soon after missed by General Christophe, he attributed the circumstance to the connivance of some Americans; in consequence. Christophe ordered the commanders and crews of all the American vessels at the Cape to be seized and put in close confinement, threatening to shoot or hang them all. Upon an investigation, however, it appeared that the Americans had not aided the escape of the fugitives, who had, in fact, succeeded inmaking | Teapr. The degradation, to which the Americans trading to the indigene ports are reduced, as low and humiliating as any thing to be found in the annals of the Dutch at Japan. Such is the opinion of the Americans, entertained by the blacks, in consequence of the meanness of some that trade there, that Dessalines laughs at the law of congress, interdicting the trade, and in) exulting and contemptuous language declares that" as long as he has a bag of coffee or a dollar, he sill never want Americans ready and willing to buy them, in disregard of all laws."

A gentleman of this city is said to be Dessaline's correspondent and agent. It was mentioned at the Cape, by persons who had intercourse at the black court, that Dessalines had purchased an estate in Pennsylvania, near Philadelphia, as a retreat in the event of an imperial boulversement.

Mr. Kirkland, formerly editor of the Washington Federalist, was at the Cape, and had mounted the indigene cockade in the service of the black emperor.

It would be relieusous to suppose, indeed, that, after having made his will the law of continental Europe, Bonaparte would relax in the least from his former pretensions and demandsnothing has occurred since the peace of Amiens to lessen his power, his sleets have expirienced disasters, but these disasters have not been felt by the nation; France is not dependent upon the superio.ity of navel power either for the manufacture or the vent of its commodities, but on the contrary the greater the difficulty on the ocean the greater has been Bonaparte's zeal to compensate by extending continental correspondence and intercourse-It, in fact, Bonaparte were the most ambitious, all-grasping man, that ever governed an European power, would it be surprising-he has conquered every foe, and been able to dictate terms to all his neighbors-will such a man, can it be expected, stoop to the British nation, and until he grants what the British call favorable terms, they pledge themselves to carry on the war.

France has shut out England from a commercial connexion with nearly the whole of the continent; his movements in the north are evidently intended for the purpose of closing the few ports that remain, and in all probability the Baltiche has nothing to oppose him, he has cither subdued, frightened, purchased, or married into, every reigning family, and it has become the absolute interest of them all to maintain the power of France.

The king of Prussia, we find, is to be honored with the title of emperor of the north-this and the surrender of Hanover, would have quieted any objections to the incorporation of Holland with France, if Prussia had dared to make any. The incorporation of Holland is no longer a matter of doubt, it is only remarkable that it did not take place long ago.

The Expose of the French government, which is mentioned under the Boston head, we shall he glad to see published entire-it will scarcely be possible to exaggerate in describing the prosperous condition and enormous power of

the French empire.

[.N. Y. paper] Washington, February 16, 1306.

Since I wrote you that the merchants' address to the president of the United States, respecting the official conduct of our a inister at Paris had been duly forwarded according to request, I have re--ceived an answer to that communication, which I now send you for the information of the complainants.

The president has assured me that, in consequence of the minister's opinion that underwriters were not intitled to the indemnification for the losses they suffered because the premiums they received gave them ample profits, a letter disapproving that opinion was written to the minister, by secretary of state. Explanations are expected from Mr. A. by the government. From these it is hoped it will be known precisely whether that cpinion solely decided the claim of the ship New Jersey; as well as what the opinion formerly was, and under what circumstances and views of the subject it was pronounced. It is deemed fair and proper to hear the minister's statement of the transaction; and not make up a final judgment upon a partial survey of the

While reasonable time is given for elucidation on these points, I am authorized to assure the merchants and underwriters, that Mr. Jefferson has no doubt of the right of insurers to stand in the place of the insured; and that this right will be asserted and maintained on every
