The oficial details of the naval victory off St. Demingo, appear in the London Guzette Ixtraordinary of the 24th of March, which were received by the King Fisher, the cutter dispatched for that pur-

LONDON, March 22. The new Kings of Bavaria and Wirtemberg, and the Elector of Baden, have, independently, at the desire of France, prohibited the importation of British ar-

The American Minister in London is treated with marked attention; and there is no doubt a good understanding will be soon restored between Great Britain and the U. States.

The Duke of Kent, is to have the military command in Ireland.

A report was current yesterday, that the Brazils have been taken by a French fleet, but it was regarded as an unauthenticated rumour.

Mr. Curran is appointed Master of the Rolls in Ireland. Sixteen thousand French troops are or-

dered to occupy Dueseidorf and Wetzlar which are to be ceded to France. Frankfort, in addition to the impost of

four millions of Francs, levied by France has been compelled to pay upwards of 500,000 florins more in requisition for hay, straw, oats, &c. Report says that Sir John Moore is to

succeed Lord Lake, as commander in chief in India. It is added that the gallant general is to be accompanied by his regiment, the 52d, one of the finest in the service.

Admiral Thornborough arrived off Rochesort on the 3d instant, in the Prince of Wales, with the Malta, Achille, Illustrious, Conqueror, Pallas, and Molante. The Latona was watching the port; where there is one three decker, four 74 gun ships, four frigates, two corvetes, and two brigs, at single anchor, ready for

The letters brought by the Townshend packet from Lishon were delivered yesterday morning. We received some Madrid Guzettes by the same opportunity. The Gibraltar Gazette of the 1st instant contains the following intelligence; "Mr. Cartwright, his Majesty's consul general at Algiers, landed here on the 27th ult. from the Niger frigate. Mr. Cartwright, after trying in vain every means in his power to obtain satisfaction respecting various demands, consistent with the treaties between our government and the regency, and finding it impossible to avert the daily insults which the Dey and his agents offered to the British Legation and subjects, intimated he intended to depart, and demanded his passports, which were granted him without difficulty."

LIVERPOOL, March 26. Batavian Gazettes to the 19th inst. have been received. The French troops evacuated the Austrian territory finally, Brannan excepted, on the last day of February: The news of the establishment of a perfect understanding between France and Prussia, with regard to the interior changes in Germany, has been lately circulated with increased credit through the Empire. A letter from the Hague of the 17th says ;-

" A Courier extraordinary, dispatched on the 12th inst. by Gen. Dumonceau, from his head quarters at Nassau Dietz, arrived yesterday afternoon, with intelligence that the Batavian division, which has hitherto made part of the French Grand army in Germany, has commenced its march for this Republic. It marches in four columns, commanded by general Quaita and Hadel, Colonel Martuschewitz and general Heldring. It is expected that the whole will reach. Nimeguen between the 25th and 28th inst. General Dumonceau, the commander, is expected here on the 19th."

The Courier du Bas Rhin, published at Wesel, on the 12th inst. observes:--

" It appears as if we were near the moment in which the future fate of the different countries, districts, cities, &c. was about to be decided, and the cessions to be realised. The contractors are to receive 100l. consols, and the biddings to be in the reduced. The first instalment is to be paid on the 15th April.

PHILADELPHIA, May 10.

We have this day the painful task of recording one of the most disastrous occurrences, that has befallen our city.

About eight o'clock last evening, a fire broke out in the shop of Mr. Burr, trunk maker, near the north west corner of Dock and Third-streets-The wind blowing very fresh from the westward, and any of the adjoining buildings being of wood, closely and inconveniently situated, the progress of the flames was rapid-and, for some time, threatened to be very ex-

The active, skilful, and persevering efforts of the several hose and fire companies, aided by the great body of citizens, whose exertions were unremitting, at length prevailed—and the fire was subdued, after consuming, as we are informed, nineteen Brick Houses & Stores, and ten frame buildings.

The house occupied by Mr. Vallence, Upholsterer, in Front street, between Walnut and Chesnut-streets, was fired by a brand, which lodged on the roof, and was nearly; consumed.

Some of our zealous sellow citizens, received personal hurts; but we do not understand that any lives were lost.

By the law of nations, as settled by the most approved authors, no other restraint is acknowledged on the trade of neutral. nations, with those at war, than that it shall be impartial between the latter; that it shall not extend to articles deemed contraband of war; nor to the transportation of persons in military service; nor to places actually, blockaded or besieged. Every other commerce of a neutral with a belligerent is lawful, and every other restraint by a belligerent on a neutral un-

The list of contraband is well defined, as are also the circumstances which constitute a blockade. The best authorities have united in confining the first to such articles as are used in war and are applicable to military purposes; and require to constitute the latter the disposition of such a force, consisting of stationary ships, so near the port, as to make it dangerous for the ships of a neutral power to enter it.
