Sect. 2 And be it enacted and or lained, That the said elders and trustees, before they or any managers appointed by them, proceed to the sale of any ticket or tickets in said lottery shall give and execute a bond to the Mavor and city council or Baltimore, in the penai sum of tifty theusand dollars, conditioned, that they will well and truly apply the monies arising therefrom to the payment of prizes drawn therein to the adventurers to whom they shall be due and the necessary expenses incurred in the management thereof; and that within thirty days after the drawing of the said I ttery, they shall pay to the register, for the use of the city, the sum of six dollars in every hundre dollars of the sum proposed to be raised by the scheme aforesaid; and further conditioned, that they shall apply the residue to the purp scaforesaid.
