The sloop Republican, Dennison, of Sag-Harbor, in 5 days from Savannah Sailed in co. with the brig Eliza and Mary, Starr, for New-York; brig Dispatch, and schr Rambler, for Boston; and sloop Eliza, Allen, for Providence, R. I.

The sloop Semiramis, Slocom, in 5 days from Charleston. CITY OF BALTIMORE.

AN ORDINANCE

Making appropriations for the year eighteen hundred and six.
BE it enacted and ordained by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore That there be appropriated to the deepening and preserving the harbor of Baltimore, to be paid out of any money arising from the duty on tonnage of vessels, and auctioneers, the sum of six thousand dollars, to be laid out and expended under the direction of Elias Ellicott, David Winchester and Baltz Shtzfer, in conjunction with the mayor

For cleansing the streets, a sum not exceeding three thousand dollars,
For removing nuisances, a sum not exceeding twelve hundred dollars,
To the health-officer for the ensuing twelve months, commencing from his appointment, one thousand dollars,
For the health department, a sum not exceeding fifteen hundred dollars,
For printing, election expenses, and incidentals, a sum not exceeding five hundred dollars,
For repairing the paved streets, lanes and alleys, a sum not exceeding seven hundred dollars,
For paving cross streets, lanes and alleys, a sum not exceeding fifteen hundred dollars,
For watching and lighting the city, a sum not exceeding twelve thousand dollars,
For the superintendent of the powder magazine for the ensuing twelve months, five hundred dollars,
For altering and widening the footways, in the manner directed by an ordinance, entitled, "An ordinance, to improve the footways in the City of Baltimore," passed the twenty-second day of March, eighteen hundred and four, a sum not exceeding one thousand dollars,
For filling up North Church-street from Calvert-street to New Lane, to be expended under the direction of the city commissioners, a sum not exceeding three hundred dollars,
For walling the ends of the public streets terminating at Jones' Falls, between Baltimore street and Water-street bridges, a sum not exceeding four hundred dollars,
To enable the register to employ a clerk to assist him in the discharge of the duties of his office, the sum of two hundred dollars,
For taking up the wooden kerbs in the eighth ward, and replacing the same with stone, a sum not exceeding five hundred and fifty dollars.

For paving the public's part of Fall's market space, a sum not exceeding nine hundred and eighty dollars.

For filling up and graveling that part of the market space in the eighth ward which lies between Alisanna-street and the north end of the new market-house, and a space at the south end of the same, to be expended under the direction of the city commissioners, a sum not exceeding four hundred dollars.

For cutting down the banks at the intersection of Sharpe and Lee-streets, and to make Welcome-alley passable at the intersection of Sharpe-street, to be expended under the direction of the city commissioners, a sum not exceeding one hundred dollars.

For making a sewer and turning an arch for the conveyance of water through an alley adjoining the property of Erasmus Ullier called Frenchman's alley, to be expended under the direction of the city commissioners, a sum not exceeding one thousand dollars.

For the purchase of ground for a sewer, and paving the same, between Pottery-street and High-street in Old-town, to be expended under the direction of the city commissioners, a sum not exceeding six hundred and fifty dollars.

For the purchase of ground of William Rainy, to widen Little York-street, the sum of five hundred dollars.

To Thomas Cole, a sum due him for filling in Pitt-street wharf in the eighth ward, ninety-seven dollars and fifty cents.

To Jos. Buys and Jos. Allender, a sum by them expended for kerb stones in the eighth ward, thirty-three dollars and sixty cents.

To repair the passes and sewers at the intersection of Hill, Lee and Barre-streets, with Howard street, to be expended under the direction of the city commissioners, a sum not exceeding two hundred dollars.

To pay the amount borrowed for the purchase of lots adjoining Hanover market, erecting a weigh-house, and finishing the same, and erecting a fish-market, the sum of seven thousand one hundred and sixty dollars and seventy-one cents.

To the clerk of the Centre-market, in addition to his salary, the sum of one hundred dollars; to the clerk of Fell's Point market, seventy-five dollars; and to the clerk of the Hanover-market, forty dollars.

For oiling, winding and regulating the clock in the steeple of the German Reformed church, the sum of fifty dollars.

For paying a balance due Conrad Miller, nine hundred and twenty dollars and ten cents; a balance due George Lightner, the sum of fourteen hundred and eighty-two dollars and seventy cents; and one thousand and thirty dollars and forty four cents, a balance due John Marsh, on account of paving

To Joseph Jacobs, one hundred and eight dollars, in full for extra services in the year eighteen hundred and one. For paying John Hilien a balance due him for putting a post and rail fence round the hospital lot, the sum of forty-one dollars and seven cents. As an additional salary to the commissioners of the watch, to be apportioned between them by the mayor, the sum of one hundred dollars. For paying Ludwig Herring, such sum as he may be entitled to receive for paving and logging the foundation of the walls erected at the east end of Hawk and Swan-streets, in the sixth ward, a sum not exceeding two hundred dollars.

11. And be it enacted and ordained, That the mayor may from time to time draw on the register of the city, to the amount of the aforesaid several appropriations, for their respective purposes, who is hereby directed to lay before the city council a full and particular account of the expenditures of said money, with the vouchers thereon.
