I have old red my minister to sign, this morning, a treaty with the Prince of Schwartzenberg, according to which] shall join my troops with those of your Imperial and Royal Majesty. In doing tais, sire. I have been willing to give you proof of my inviolable attachment. Please to permit me it present to appeal o your paternal heart: My son, the herecitary electoral Prince, is at present in ance: as I constantly believed in peace, allowed him to trave first in Italy, and hen in the southern povinces of France, here he finds himsel at present. If I an obliged to march my troops against ne French, my child is lost: but if, on he contrary, I remaintranquilly in my states, I shall obtain tine to let him return. I therefore begyour Imperial and Royal Maj sty, on my Inces, to consent to my neutrolity. I dan to engage my most sacred word, that my troops shall in nothing hinder the perations of your army; and in case, (bu which is by no means probable) your roops should be obliged to retreat, I swear and promise, to remain tranquil, and to undertake nothing. A father, dryen to the most dreadful desperation, begs grace in favour of his son. Your Imperial and Royal Majesty will please notto deny me this lavor-I dare to flatter myself, that the Emperor of Russia will not be against it.

The fatal experi nce of last night, evinces how it. ff. ctual all the afforts of our hose compari s, and fire engines may ne, in cases of conflagration, among very combustible mate i.i's, and in very windy weather. It is not, however, intended, to discourage the usefuln ss of the hose or the engine; far from it; on the contrary, it is admitted, that but for hese very serviceable articles, together with the copious supply of Sc uylkill water funished by the hydrants, the destruction would probably have been vastly greater. But I submit to the public, a plan of liniting the progress of fires, be the violence of the wind what it may.

Let our fire companies provide thenselves with pieces of blanketing as large as may be completely manageable. Let. them be quilted together, ti ree, four, or five fold thick, and calculated to lap over each other. When a house is on fire let the roof of the next one be covered with these quiltings, previously saturated with water impregnated with pot ash. Letone or two engines be employed to discharge water upon this covering so as to keep it constantly dripping wet. It is believed that with proper management this plan would prevent the extension of fire among brick buildings beyond the house in which it first began. It is worth
