NEWBURYPORT May 8. Arrived, Brig Five Sisters, Bottler, 30 days from Guadaloupe. Spoke no line. Extract of a letter from Capt. Peeres of the schooner Maryland, to his owners, dated St. Jago, 28th March.

"I arrived here the 23rd inst. after being chased in the Cayos passage by two French privateers, and brought to anchor under the West Cayos, when they boarded my effian people on board one of the privateers. Mr. Tice abused in a most shameful manner, they put me in irons, and then proceeded to plunder the ship, they hoisted all the dry goods on deck, and of each every box: what they took away, I do not as yet know. They robbed the vessel of her small chests, all her square rigging, rigger and tackle, paints, oil, and a number of other articles; a number of boxes of raisins, all my fowls, eggs, butter, great coats, hats, shoes, and a greater part of the people's clothes. They had a rope rove from the mast head, and round the neck of one of the people for half an hour, to make him swear we were bound to Cape Frae is, and threatened my life more than twenty times. After d. taining us about 12 hours, they suffered us to proceed."

AN ORDINANCE

Appropriating a sum of money for filling up and widening Lee-street.

WHEREAS, by an act of the General Assembly of Maryland, passed at November session, 1796, the owners of lots bounding and running with Camden, Conway, Barre and Lee-streets, were permitted to fill up and extend said lots to the line of the east side of Light-street and Forrest-street, and were thereby directed to give notice to the special commissioners of Baltimore town, to make their choice or election to fill up and extend said streets, otherwise the party binding thereon should be at liberty to fill up and wharf the same, and for ever thereafter to enjoy all the rights and benefits of wharfage at the end of said streets.

Be it therefore enacted and ordained by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, That the city commissioners be and they are hereby appointed and directed to fill up and wharf Lee-street to the line of the east side of Light-street and Forrest-street, and wharf the same in such manner as with the approbation of the Mayor they may judge best, and that they draw on the register of the city for any sum not exceeding eight hundred dollars for the purpose aforesaid.
