

consequence of false character given of this by the defendants. The trial last evening the whole of Thursday week; in the jury, after retiring, for a considerable time, brought in a verdict for the defendants.

On Thursday, Mr. Windham submitted to the House of Commons his Plan for the improvement of our military system. The principal object of this plan is the permanent increase of the regular army; and the means by which it is proposed to attain this object are as follow: The soldier, instead of engaging for life, as at present, is only to enlist for seven years; at the end of that period, if he be disposed to enter again for a similar term, he is to have a small increase of pay; and also a further increase of pay, if he should choose to enlist for a third term of 7 years. At the conclusion of the 21 years service, he is then to be entitled to all the full allowance of Chelsea, and the advantages of that retreat are to be augmented. In the Cavalry and artillery, instead of dividing the whole term of service into three equal portions of seven years, it is to be divided into periods of 10, 6 and 5 years.

In the militia, no alteration whatsoever is to take place for the present with respect to their number, but in future they are to be recruited, not by the present system of ballot, but by a small bounty; and the Militia of Ireland are to be encouraged as much as possible to enter into the line.—With respect to the volunteers, they are not after the present year, to enjoy their present advantage; they are only to be exempted from the general training of the male population of the country, which forms an essential part of the New System.—With respect to the *Levy en Masse*, the male population is to be divided into three classes: the first including all from the age of 16 to 24, the second from 21 to 32, and the third from 32 to 43. Of these three classes, 300,000 are to be trained for 26 days every year, and are to receive one shilling a day every day they are out. The regulations of the volunteer system are not to extend to Ireland. This is the general outline of the plan, which Mr. Windham opened with his usual ability. He concluded a speech, the delivery of which occupied nearly four hours, with moving for leave to bring in a bill to repeal the Act of 1803, commonly called "the Levy en Masse Act."—Mr. Fox, who is happy to state, was well enough to attend the house, and to take a share in the debate.

COMMUNICATION.

The publication in the evening Post on the 14th inst. suited articles of association of the "Mechanics' Bank of Baltimore," it is conceived, when rightly understood, will prevent many Mechanics and others, from judging and acting improperly at this juncture, and from espousing a measure they afterwards, upon better information, may have cause to regret. Under this impression, the writer hereof, will endeavor to avoid any thing personal, he will strive not to wound, but heal, not to sow, but to prevent division. The following concise view of facts, may suffice at present to elucidate this business.

At a late meeting of Mechanics and other Citizens, eighteen persons were appointed to act as commissioners, and originate the proposed institution; at the second meeting of said commissioners, it was thought best, for the dispatch of business, to appoint a committee of five of their body to prepare articles of association, who were instructed as soon as they were ready to report, they should call a meeting of the commissioners.—After the business in question had taken this form, and whilst the committee were engaged in the duty assigned them, it should seem that the fears of a few, otherwise worthy characters, were somehow excited, apprehending thro' an overzeal perhaps, that the Mechanics' interest and influence, was not properly attended to in the committee; notwithstanding it could be but very imperfectly known if known at all, what the committee would report, and much less what form such report would assume when acted upon—and thence permitted themselves to be hurried into that publication, apparently in opposition to the regular train in which the business was progressing.

From the above statement it is easy to discern, that the said publication, to say no worse of it, was under existing circumstances, very irregular, improper, & ill timed; and it is much to be regretted that the publishers could not perceive that its natural and most direct tendency could be no other than to divide the Mechanics, and in that event, frustrate the establishment of any institution of the kind.

It is hoped, however, that upon calm and deliberate reflection, the gentlemen, in opposition to the regular plan, will yet forsake the ground they have taken, and uniting with their friends, "like a band of brothers join." And the mechanics generally, and their well-wishers, may rest assured that the committee have not been inattentive to their concerns and interests, as they may expect shortly to see the articles of association of the Mechanics' Bank of Baltimore brought to public view, and under the patronage, it is presumed, of respectable characters.
