It is stated; however, that the military preparations in Russian Poland still continue, and the Russian armies will be ready for every event.

It does not appear that Hamburgia itself has yet been occupied by any French or Prussian troops.—The French. who were at Hameln, have all marched for Wesel. The Prussians have the task of executing Bonaparte's commands in and near the territories he has ceded.

Private letters from Hamburgh, .complain bitterly of the change they are now compelled to suffer from the politics of Prussia; or rather from the preponderance of France. The note of Count Schulenburgh, from Hanover, of the 28th, had apprised them of their river being shut against the trade with England. By this time they know that their river is blockaded.

The Austrian Government, it is said, refused the demand of the French respecting a passage by Pintcha to the Italian States, and likewise demurred to the demand of a passage through Bohemia for the French troops in case of war with Russia continuing. The object of that demand, as we have already stated, we have no doubt was to alarm the Austrian Government for the consequences of the French troops reaching Poland. The story of the Russians scizing the

Rocca di Calabro is told differently in the accounts from Vicnna. It is stated that a small corps of French troops had actually taken possession, when the Russians landed and took it, making the French prisoners. This exonerates the Austrians from any responsibility. The Russians landed, it is said, are above 3000. This affair will cause considerable noise, if the Russians can maintain the port which they have thus dexterously seized. In this quarter a most important struggle between the French and Russian interests may be expected, because, in the opinion of each, the Russian Empire s the prize contended for. It seems to be confirmed that, to some

extent at least, Bonaparte had been recognised by the Porte, and a Turkish Ambassador at Paris is appointed. This is the consequence of the Peace of Presburgh and the cession of Dalmatia; meanwhile the Turkish province of Servia is in the utmost disorder-an argument and inducement for neighbours to interfere.

The French, it is said, have already begun the building of ten ships of the line on the stocks at Venice. It is said that the Imperial free city of Frankfort is to retain its independence, with a garrison of 1000 French troops, under the Commandant of Mentz.

Saturday evening Batavian Gaz tics of Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday last reached town.

We have no longer any doubts that their High Mightinesses the States General were disposed to be refractory, and pre sumed to think for themselvs, in opposi-"tion to the mandates of their Imperial ally and protector Napoleon. The proceedings, in, the Batavian Legislature have been withheld from the public. Not one of the Dutch Papers has dared to alude to any thing which took place at any of their sittings since their extraordinary convocation on the 1st inst. . Had they received with acclamations the proposal supposed to have been made to them by the Grand Pensionary, there would have been no occasion for such extraordinary secrecy. Their contumacy, however, is not likely to lost much longer. On Wednesday a strong French force began to enter Holland & the functions of the States General are probably, by this time, extinct. Before the end of the week, we may expect to hear that Prince Louis has been appointed King of Holland or Batavia, or whatever fantastical name the Corsican King-maker may chuse to give the new Dionarchy.

It was confidently reported at Rotterdam on Tuesday, that a heavy contribution had been imposed by the French on Hamburgh, Altona, and several of the neighbouring towns. The pretence for these acts of extortion and robbery we understand to be the facility afforded by these cities to the receipt and transsit of English merchandize. The rumour does not enable us to ascertain whether this imposition is to be levied by a Prussian force, under the orders of M. Bourienne, or whether the terror of his mere mandate will be sufficient to enforce it.

COPEHNAGEN, April 5 .- We have received accounts, that the harbours of the North Sea; as well as the rivers Rowing into them, will be closed against the English shipping and commerce, as they were when the French! had possession of Hanover; but we learn; that this is not to be understood with respect to the harburs belonging to his Danish Majasty, Tonningen, Hosum, &c. as the nature of the thing purports-Advices from Stockholm say, that several regiments had received orders to march to the southward, and that preparations to embark them are making at Carlscrone.

The mail due yesterday arrived this day, and has brought some intelligence not a little interesting in the present state of Europe

When we first heard of the Russians having taken possession of Cattaro, we stated our opinion that it would lead to complaints and rev monstrances on the part of the French Government and such in fact has been the result According to letters from Vienna of the 2d inst. France has not failed to complain of the occunation of that position by the Russians, and cir wunstances have furnished her with some spe-

cious reason for this complaint, as 80 Austrians. | Brig Isabella, Craig, were still in the fortress when the Russianstook possession. Great compliants have in conscquence been made to the Calinet of Vienna which is charged with having given ground for suspicion of bad faith, secret intrigues, a culpapable understanding with the Court of St. Petersburgh, &c.

The Austrian Ministry endeavored to prove the contrary; but being forced to enter into explanations with the Russian Ambassador, Count de Rasum wasky, and to demand the evacuation of Cattaro, they received an answer to the following effect:

"Courts neither have nor can have any other rule for their political conduct than the acts, documents and public treaties, which found and establish the interests and respective obligations of powers towards each other. Now by the Treaty of Presburgh, you engaged to cede Venetian Dalmatia to France: forty days after the signing of that treaty, his Russian Imperial Majesty, from respect to the Emperor of Austria, not only waited till that time was elapsed, but placed an interval of several weeks between its termination and his hostilities against France in Dalmatia. Russia could attribute the delay of Austria only to two causes; either a change in the dispositions of the treaty of Prerburgh, or a condescension towards France, who, not having yet had time to collect all her forces, and take measures to defend the point menaced, had required this delay from Austria, in order to evade the attack of Russia, who was then ready; that as to the first of these suppositions, it could be of no avail, because neither Austria nor France had officially notified this charge in the Appulations of the treaty, a necessary condition in the law of nations; and that as to the second, which he believed to be the true one, it became precisely a motive for the Cabinet of St. Petersburgh to act with more vigor, in order not to risk a delay which would have defeated its project."

The same Ambassador is said to have added, that if a passage through the hereditary States was granted to the French, it was to be expected that Russia would demand the same favor wherever her security might require it.

The King of Sweden has lately declared, that he should consider any attack made upon the independence of Lauenburgh, while under the Philac Iphia. protection of his troops, in the same light as if it were directed against his own dominions -The march of the Prussian detachment into that territory has in consequence of the above declaration, been countermanded; and orders given them to take possession only of such parts as were evacuated by the Swedes, or left open without any obstacle or impediment.

Captain Whitsides, arrived at Norfolk, from Barracoa, informs that on the 6th. of May, a French felucca privateer came into Barracoa, who had been engagea with two Baltimore schooners: mounted one long twelve pounder, and dud forty men, out of whom she had 7 killed, and 18 wounded; her bow and quartersstove in; her hull, rigging and sails greaty injured. The privateersmen declar., that in consequence of this action, they will put to death every American they meet coming from St. Domingo.

A private letter from a gentleman in London, to his feiend in Philadelih, ettions, that the Board of Health of the city of London, had lately agreed in a belief that the yellow tever was not a contaguous disease, and of course that it could not be imported from one country into another.

It is stated that the French have been treating with Portugal for Goa, on the coasts of Malabar-that their object in this acquisition is to have a strong hold, in the neighborhood of the English East India possessions. Goa is the metropolis of a delightly and rich country. It is the principal city in the Portuguese India set. tlements and is very strong. If France requires the relinquishment of it by Portugal, there can be no doubt but it must be granted; but Bonaparte should likewise treat for a passage to Goa. That will be as important as the cession of the country, and infinitely more difficult to Boston Repertory.

POTATOES.

As the usual season for planting potatoes is now coming on, it may not be improper to advise the strewing Plaster of Paris in the rows. as soon as they dropped, and before covering them. This practice, from repeated experience, has been found to promote the growth of the plants, to cause them to come up quickly, of a deep green color; and also to increase the quantity and the goodness of the crop. If the potatoes be cut, the seed may also be plastered before planting.

Longevity.—Mr. Bingley, in his tour through North Wales, speaking of the healthiness of the vale of Efestmoig, says, (on the authority of Lord Lyttleton) that not long ago, there died in that neighborhood an honest Welsh farmer, who was 105 years of age. By his first wife he had thirty children, ten by his second, four by his third, and seven by two concubines-His youngest son was eighty-one years younger than the eldest --- 800 persons, that descended from his body, attended his funeral!
