From the Skind Radieren. The operations of the French Emperor arrest the attention of the world. The bounds of his ambition are not fixed upon the European portion of the Globe. The expedition to Egypt has confirmed the public opinion that he has not forgotten the transactions of the East, and the late dxpeditions to the West Indies prove that I received. he has not overlooked the possessions of the nation in America, or any claims which he can indulge. In recounting the fate of the European nations, l'ortugal has not been forgotten. . But such is its small extent of domestic territory, and such its antient political history, that it was expected Portugal, whenever it should engage the attention of the French, would be annexed to the kingdom of an Ally, and become a part of Spain. The delay to accomplish this work was attributed more to the dependant and feeble state of Portugal than to any neglect of its usefulness to France or Spain. But another negociation is reported in Europe. It is not the policy of France to render the great powers greater, but to mulitiply the separate political interests of the Continent. It is some convenient territory to its neighbor, and to content itself with its southern territories. Whatever may belong to these reports, the motive which is assign ed for this division is not inconsistent with the policy of the French Emperor. In consideration of these advantages Portugal is to become an ally, and to resign to France its most distinguished colony in the East Indies. The situation of Goa, is well known. "Genoa, March 23.—The Chamber of Commerce has been charged by order of his serene highness the Arch-Treasurer, to announce that the Regency of Tunis is preparing a considerable armament to effect a landing on some part of the coast of Italy. The armament consists of a frigate, a sloop of war, two brigs, and two galleys, with troups on board.

"The chamber of commerce believes it useful to give this information, particularly to the Neapolitan vessels now at Genoa, as the Regency has not yet recognized the Captains, who command vessels sailing under the flag of Naples, as French subjects.
