Health-Office, Baltimore,

THE Board of Health, considering that the season is now at hand, when it is of the utmost consequence that the city should be kept clean; that if filth and impurity of any kind is suffered to remain and accumulate therein, it cannot but be injurious to health; and that from whatever source a certain malignant disease may be derived, there is but one sentiment prevalent with physicians, respecting the fatal tendency of impure air, and the noxious effluvia arising from putrid animal or vegetable substances. The Board, therefore, deem it incumbent on them to call the attention of their fellow-citizens to the obligation imposed upon every one by the first and fundamental law of nature—the preservation of health, in order to the preservation of life.

Householders are earnestly entreated to be vigilant, and diligently attentive to have their cellars kept clear of stagnant water; and their back-yards sweet and clean; and not to suffer their servants to be gathering impurities there of any kind, whether of animal or vegetable matter, to the injury of their own and their neighbors' health; and to have the low and sunken places on their premises, containing stagnant water, filled up with good earth. They are also requested, in conformity to the health ordinances of the city, to have the gutters in front of their houses daily cleaned; this is certainly a trifling labor, yet, when neglected, of pernicious consequence to the health of those who dwell immediately in front of them; and nothing is more offensive, in passing through the city, than to see the gutters, from one end to the other, full of filth, rubbish and mire, annoying both the sight and the smell.

Measures have been taken by the board during the last winter and spring, to have the privies in the city generally cleaned by night-men, appointed and authorized by the board for that purpose, and much has been done in that way; but as the approaching season will not permit a continuance of that mode, it is earnestly recommended, whenever those places become offensive in the warm weather, that a bucket of lime or ashes be thrown thereon, in a scattering manner, once a week, to correct their bad effects.

Individuals are also entreated to be attentive to cleanliness. Individual cleanliness cannot be dispensed with; it is essentially necessary to the preservation of health; this involves cases which it is impossible for any police to reach, and therefore cannot be too strongly recommended; where this is wanting in such a climate as ours during the summer months, disease is likely to ensue, and thence may be propagated.

The city constables and superintendents of streets are called upon and required to be attentive to their duty; and without fear, favor or affection, to collect the fine imposed by the health ordinance upon all delinquent house-keepers who do not keep their gutters clean, passed March 22, 1803, as follows:

And be it enacted and ordained, That it shall be the duty of each and every occupier of any house or houses, or owner of any lot or lots, fronting upon each and every paved street, lane or alley within the city aforesaid, to keep the gutters in front of the house, houses, lot or lots, clean, at all times, during the months of April, May, June, July, August, September, and October; and each and every person or persons herein offending, shall forfeit and pay, for each offence, twenty-five cents for the use of the city.

The board request the cheerful and prompt co-operation of every good citizen, as well as the particular officers alluded to.

PROPOSALS

FOR CARRYING
MAILS OF THE UNITED STATES,
On the following post-roads, will be received at the General Post-Office, until the first day of August next, inclusive.

From Baltimore by Elk Ridge, Vansville, Hladensburg and Washington City, to Georgetown, every day.

April 15 to December 1.

Leave Baltimore every day at 8 A. M. and arrive at Washington City by 4 P. M. in 8 hours.

Leave Washington City every day at 2 A. M. and arrive at Baltimore by 10 A. M. in 8 hours.

December 1 to April 15.

Leave Baltimore every day at 10 A. M. and arrive at Washington City by 8 P. M. in 10 hours.

Leave Washington City every day at 10 P. M. and arrive at Baltimore the next morning by 9 o'clock, in 11 hours.

NOTES.

1. The Post-master General may expedite the mails and alter the times of arrival and departure at any time during the continuance of the contracts, he previously stipulating an adequate compensation for any extra expense that may be occasioned thereby.

2. Fifteen minutes shall be allowed for opening and closing the mail at all offices where no particular time is specified.

3. For every thirty minutes delay (unavoidable accidents excepted) in arriving after the times prescribed in any contract, the contractor shall forfeit one dollar; and if the delay continues until the departure of any pending mail, whereby the mails detained for such depending mail lose a trip, an additional forfeiture of five dollars shall be incurred.

4. Newspapers as well as letters are to be sent in the mail; and if any person, making proposals, desires to carry newspapers, other than those conveyed in the mail, for his own emolument, he must state in his proposals, for what sum he will carry it with that emolument, and for what sum without that emolument.

5. Should any person, making proposals, desire an alteration of the times of arrival and departure above specified, he must state in his proposals, the alterations desired, and the difference they will make in the terms of his contract.

6. Persons making proposals, are desired to state their prices by the year. Those who contract will receive their pay quarterly, in the months of February, May, August, and November, one month after the expiration of each quarter.

7. No other than a free white person shall be employed to convey the mail.

8. Where the proposer intends to convey the mail in the body of a stage carriage, he is desired to state it in his proposals.

9. The Post-master General reserves to himself the right of declaring any contract at an end whenever three failures happen, which amount to the loss of a trip each.

10. The contracts for the above routes are to be in operation on the first day of October next, and to continue in force for two years, from that time.
