The following is a copy of an official
communication made to the Lord Mayor
yesterday. It is dated from the
"Admiralty-Office, May 4."
"A dispatch has been received this morn-
ing from vice-admiral sir J. B. Warren,
giving an account of the capture of the
Marengo, of 80 guns and 640 men, rear-
admiral Linois, and the Belle Poule, of 40
guns and 320 men, on the 14th of March,
after a running fight of some hours, with
his majesty's ship London and the Amazon
frigate.

The Paris papers acknowledge the report
of the evacuation of the mouths of the Ca-
taro to be premature; and state the return
of prince Murat from the duchies of Berg
and Cleves, and the arrival of the Batavian
commissioners appointed by the chief mag-
istrate of that republic to repair to the
court of France.
Admiral Stirling has left the Channel in
quest of the French squadron. His force
consists of the Glory, of 98 guns; Bar-
fleur, of 98 guns; Mars, of 74 guns;
Dragon, of 34 guns; Revenge, of 74
guns; Warrior, of 74 guns; Niobe frigate,
and a brig.

It is at length finally settled that the earl
of Lauderdale is to go out governor-general
of our territories in India.
By a letter received this day, it appears
that 27 chests of specie were landed at
Weymouth on Thursday, from the wreck
of the Abergavenny East-Indiaman.
The Milan frigate, at Portsmouth, is fit-
ting for the reception of admiral Berkeley,
to convey him to Halifax.
Died, on Monday morning, at his house
in Sloane-street, at Knightsbridge, sir R.
Ford, chief magistrate of Bow-street.
May 6.

The attendance at lord Melville's trial
was yesterday more numerous than on any
of the preceding five days. This was sup-
posed to be owing to the increased curiosi-
ty which was raised by the expected examina-
tion of Mr. Trotter, Alter Messrs. Oli-
phant Standard and A. Douglas had been
examined upon points of less moment, Mr.
Trotter was called, and his examination
continued from half past twelve till four.
This most important witness was exam-
ined in the first instance by Mr. Wintbread,
and cross-examined by Mr. Plummer, At
the close of his cross-examination, Mr.
Whitbread declared his intention to re-ex-
amine him; but it being understood from
the honorable gentlemen, that the re-ex-
amination would occupy some time, the
court adjourned till Wednesday.
A letter from Bombay, Dec. 11th, con-
tains a very satisfactory account of the dis-
tribution of our naval force in the Indian
seas

As it is also deemed very probable that

countrymen in the Bay of St. Domingo.

Copy of a letter from Sir John Borlase
Warren, Bart. and K. B. vice admiral
of the blue, &c. to Wm. Marsden, Esq.
ated on board his majesty's ship Fou-
droyant, at sea, the 14th of March,
1806.

SIR,
I request you will communicate to their
Lordships, that at half past three A. M. on
the 13th of March, his majesty's ship the
London, which I had stationed to wind-
ward of the squadron, having wore, and
made the signal for some strange sails, I
directed the squadron to wear likewise upon
the larboard tack, the wind being at WSW
and day light appeared, made the signal for
a general chase, soon after the London was
observed in action with a large ship and a
frigate, and continued supporting a running
fire with those ships, which were endeavor-
ing to escape, until half past seven, when
the Amazon, being the advanced ship, pur-
sued also and engaged the frigate, which
was attempting to bear away. The remain-
der of the squadron bearing fast upon the

enemy (and the action having continued
from before day light until forty three mi-
nutes after nine A. M.) the line of battle ship
bearing the flag of a Rear Admiral struck;
and at forty three minutes past the above
hour the frigate also followed her example,
when an officer came on board the Fou-
droyant with Admiral Linois's sword, and
informed me that the ships which had sur-
rendered to his majesty's colours were the
Marengo of 80 guns, 640 men, and the
Belle Poule of 40 guns, 320 men, return-
ing to France from the East Indies; these
ships being the remainder of the French
squadron who committed so much depreda-
tion upon the British commerce in the east
ern world. I have much satisfaction in stat-
ing the gallant conduct of captains Sir Har-
ry Neale and William Parker supported by
the zeal and bravery of the officers and
crews of their respective ships, who claim
my warmest thanks and acknowledgements
and whose exertions, I hope, will recom-
mend them to their Lordships' particular no-
tice and favor. I cannot, however, avoid
regretting that the force of the enemy did not
afford to the officers and men of the other
ships of the squadron, who shewed the
most earnest desire to have closed with the
enemy, an opportunity of displaying that
valour and attachment to their king and
country which I am confident they will be
happy to evince upon some future and more
favorable occasion. I have enclosed a list
of the killed and wounded on board his ma-
jesty's ships as well as their defects; and
have likewise forwarded a particular state-
ment of the ships captured, together with
the loss sustained by the enemy, being the
most correct that could be ascertained from
the roll d'equipage. Rear Ad. Linois is a-
mong the wounded, as well as several other
officers.

The present policy by which the
Prussian Government are influenced has
excited the greatest dissatisfaction, which
is no where attempted to be disguised,
and which the military are by no means
active in repressing. Haugwitz is never
mentioned without the deepest execra-
tion, whilst Hardenberg is universally
beloved and respected. The windows
of the house inhabited by the former
have been broken; whilst garlands of
flowers have been affixed to the house
lately possessed by the latter.—In the
midst of this popular ferment, the dis-
tresses of the Merchants are increasing
daily, and a deputation has lately been
sent to the King at Potsdam, to lay be-
fore him the calamitous situation of their
affairs.

There was a report yesterday that
Count Haugwitz was to be sent to Eng-
land, to endeavour to adjust the differ-
ences between the two Governments.
A man more unlikely to succeed in such
a mission could not easily have been se-
lected. We do not believe the report.
On the question for the house to re-
solve itself into a committee on the bill
for repealing the additional defence act,
a debate of considerable length took
place in the house of commons last night.
Mr. Fox delivered a decisive opinion in
favour of the new military plan, but no
information was afforded with respect to
the period when the legislative meas-
ures necessary to carry it into effect
will be brought forward.—We still think
that they will not be brought forward
this season.

Sir R. Strachan has returned from
his cruise, and has rejoined the channel
fleet.—During the whole of this long
cruise he never saw a ship of the ene-
mies; either French, Spanish, or
Dutch.
