From the Salem Register.

The French have directed the public attention to the once happy country of Greece. The travels of Sonini will oblige an acquaintance with the hopes of this people. The consent is universal, that the government employed in the country is the most wretched to be imagined. The English traveller has the same conviction as the French, though they might differ about the means to accomplish the freedom of the natives from Turkish oppression. A late writer, upon the causes of the superiority of the Greeks, a question proposed by a learned society at Lyons, could not fail of expressing his convictions of the miserable state of this people. He observes, "The stupid secretaries of Islamism, incapable of the efforts of creative genius, have almost effaced the very traces of the glory of Athens; brutish and miserable slaves, without thought, and in stupid ignorance, walk over the august theatres upon which has been disputed the tragic palm, upon which have been shared the triumphs of eloquence, and which partook the glory of enlightening mankind." Sonini, comparing Egypt and Greece, observes, "Here the temperature is mild, the earth fertile, adorned with her richest productions; the situation exquisite. Every thing charms the senses; every thing is good and delightful, except the government, which we wish to forget." Mr. Eaton, the English traveller, observes, "It is rather astonishing that the Greeks have retained so much energy of character, and are not more abused; for like noble coursers, they champ the bit, and spurn indignantly the yoke; when once freed from these, they will enter the course of glory."

The sch'r Pernal, Perry, of New-Haven, on his homeward-bound passage from St. Eustatia, was taken a few days since within a short distance of Montagu Point, by the British frigate Squirrel, and sent to Halifax.—The mate and two hands were put on board of a vessel bound to Boston, and have arrived at New-Haven.

The bill regulating the commercial intercourse between the British West-Indies and the United States of America was read a second time in the Imperial Parliament on the 6th of May, and committed for the 8th. The bill vests that discretionary power in the king and council which had been hitherto exercised by subordinate magistrates in violation of law, and for which it was necessary to pass year after year an act of indemnity.

At Gravesend.—General Wolfe, Baltimore; At Lisbon; Warren, Baltimore; Experiment, Baltimore.

New York, June 23.
Arrived, ship Charles, Burgett, from London and Penance, 38 days from the latter. The ship George Washington, of Salem, from Batavia, captured some time

since and sent into Portsmouth, was condemned just before the Charles sailed, and it was said the supercargo had shot himself in consequence. June 23, in lat 44, long 50, 10, spoke brig Nancy, Kernil, 10 days from Baltimore for Hamburg.

Brig Generous Friends, Chamings, 20 days from Point-Petre, Guad. June 4, off Antigua, was boarded by the sloop of war Fox, and detained two hours.

Brig Two Brothers, Foster, of Boston, in 28 days from Barbadoes, and 15 from Tortola.

Brig Ulysses, Ingersoll, in 25 days from Demerara. Left, the sch'r Moody, from New-London, arrived 3 days before the Ulysses sailed; and brig Moody, Clarke, do. the day before.

Sch'r Betsey Fulshire, Hitchcocks, in 21 days from Montego Bay, Jam. Off Cape Antonio, was boarded by a felucca privateer, under French colors, with a crew of about 60 men, of all nations, who robbed captain Hitchcocks of his jolly-boat, lamps, lamp oil, and several other articles. Off the Havana, was boarded by the British brig of war Port Mahon, and treated politely.

Extract from the orig Susannah's log-book, from Jamaica, arrived at Philadelphia.

On the outward passage, April 30, lat. 27, 10, long. 66, 10, was brought to by the frigate Cleopatra, and boarded by the master and two men, the captain and supercargo sent on board the frigate and examined in a very strict manner; in the mean while they broke open the hatches and hoisted the floor on deck and opened it to search for cordage, and ransacked the steerage, and run probing every barrel they could get at, with an iron ramrod. After three hours attention, was politely dismissed.

May 8, at day-break, in sight of Turks Island, saw a sail to the northward in chase of us; at 6 in the evening she brought us to; was ordered on board the privateer. She proved to be a French schooner, of one gun and 55 men; they plundered us of our poultry, cabin stores, water buckets, nails, paint brushes, cordage, &c. and went in pursuit of two other Americans.

May 10, in sight of Cape Tiberon, was brought to by a French privateer of 3 guns and 75 men, ordered on board, examined, and treated politely.

June 6, spoke the brig Columbia, in sight of Cape Antonio, from Kingston, of and for Alexandria, out 4 days.

Brig Eliza, Vanneman, of Philadelphia, for Havana, to sail in 2 days; brig Spanish Lady, of do. for Old Harbour, to sail in 2 days; ship Coffin, of Portland, just arrived; sch'r Octavio, M'Cloughlin, of Charleston, from Barracoa, discharging; brig Boston, of New-York, to sail in 12 days; brig Comet, Dimond, of Baltimore, from the Main, prize cargo condemned, vessel cleared; brig Fame, Steward, of Philadelphia, vessel and cargo condemned; a number of others not recollecting, belonging to the different ports.
