

any part of our commerce was suspended for a considerable space of time, it was not so easy a task to restore it to its old channel. He conceived that this country was clearly entitled to an exclusive trade with her colonies, and he was therefore inimical to any measure which went to injure or impede that trade. The colonies ought to be made the instruments of supporting and upholding our shipping and our navigation and not rendered the means of decreasing the one and injuring the other. He did not think that any necessity had been shown for the present Bill, or for altering that mode of conduct which had been hitherto adopted with respect to the supply of our colonies.

The LORD CHANCELLOR conceived he must have totally misunderstood the Bill, if any of the arguments used against it were at all applicable. The bill merely went to vest that power and responsibility in the Executive Government which had hitherto been exercised by the Governors of our colonies, and to enable that to be done legally which had hitherto been done in violation of the law; and surely it was much more consistent with the dignity of Parliament that discretionary power should be vested in His Majesty in Council to act according to the necessity of the case, than that the law should be continually infringed by subordinate magistrates, and acts of indemnity passed year after year.

The Duke of MONTROSE, in explanation, contended that the Bill was a totally different measure, inasmuch as it went, for the first time, to authorise legally a suspension of the Navigation Act.

The Earl of CARRARON contended, that the present Bill was precisely the same measure which had received the support of the noble Lords who now opposed it when they were in office, and the adoption of which by the Governors of our colonies, they sanctioned by repeated Bills of Indemnity.

By the way, the scurvy has of late made a frequent appearance in our commercial ships, the cause of which ought to be inquired into for the means of preventing it are so well known, that a neglect of duty may always be suspected where it appears.
