#### COMMUNICATION, Relative to Commodore Truxton

(CONCLUDED.)

What are the reasons offered by commodore Truxton for having written his letter of resignation of March 3d, 1802 They are sufferent at diff.: ent times. In the letter itself, upon which alone, by the bye, government, ad to act, he stated, that, as commodore Dale had in his ship under him a cofitain of the navy, he, Thomas Truxton, in justice to his high lamed renown and to the valued honor of his family, could not proceed without being placed in the same situation. Upon this losty ground he made his first stand. And hence it was, that the Secretary of the Navy, perceiving this to be the only principle a sumed in his letter, merely stated to him in his reply—" It is well known to you there is not at this time within the U.S. a cafitain of the navy that we could require to take a secondary station on board a ship."

The commodore has since found it expedient to shift his ground. He now says, if a captain of the navy could not have been sent to him, he expected government would have let him have a master commandant or a lieutenant commandant. If such had really been his expectation, one would im gine, that, in his letter tendering his resignation, he would naturally -have asked for an officer of either of these grades in case a captuin of the navy could not have been sent to him. But as such à request was not made, how could the government have presumed such an expectation against the express and pointed language or his letter. Besides, as at that time there was not in our navy any such officer as a Muster Commandant or a Lieutenant Commundant, how, in the name of all that is wonderful, could the Secretary of the Navy, under any doctrine of presumptions, have presumed that so sage a commodore could have been expecting what he must have known did

The plain truth is, that at the time of writing his let'er of March 3d, 1802, commodore Truxton could not but have known, that there was not in the United States a captain of the navy that could have been required to take a secondary station on board a frigate, and that there was not in our navy any such officer as either a Master Commandant or a Lieutenant Commandant.

But whence is it, that this infatuated man has so often and so roundly asserted, that a lieutenant commandant ought to have been attached to his frigate- Circumscribed as have been his opportunities of acquiring correct idéas in naval affairs, he yet really ought to have known, that there camot be attached to a frigate any such officer as a lieutenaut commandant. This is well known to all navy officers of regular espication: But sor the insormation of others I would remark.
