Let not the hecatombs of butchered  
brothers, entombed on Bunker's Hill, on  
the Brandywine shores, and on Saratoga's  
heights be forgotten by you; let not the  
names of slaughtered heroes walk un-  
revenged amongst you; let not the bloody  
vestiges of tyranny, and the remembrance  
of violated chastity, and profaned temples,  
be necessary to summon you to the field;  
but rouse at once, find on your swords  
and form the line of battle.

Great Franklin's shade complains that  
you are slow, and Washington's ghost  
calls aloud to arms.

Look back at the arduous struggle  
which gave you liberty: look back at the  
events which succeeded your coming:  
look back at the difficulties which were  
made to gain and the exertions to support  
your liberty to your present standard;  
then take a view of the events which await  
you.

The political horizon of your country is  
obscur'd: the grand council seems an  
alarm, and by that virtue it called from  
her every aid.

Beware my fellow-citizens that you  
are free and independent, and appreciate  
the heaven-blessed privilege: remember that  
blood was spilt in the cause of your liberty:  
remember that eloquence flowed in its support,  
and remember that the agency which effected  
it. It was they Almighty Father, O God,  
thou givest strength to the weak, courage  
to the timid, wisdom to the dumb, and  
success to the virtuous!

Let the spirits of fallen angels there-  
fore O God praise thee; let the wisdom  
of our councils praise thee; let the  
victorious armies of Washington praise  
thee; let the Goddess of Liberty praise  
thee; let the love and fellowship of these  
United States praise thee; yet, let all the  
people thereof praise and adore thee!

prepare to watch the manoeuvres of foreign  
enemies, guard against the insidious  
views of artful domestic demagogues;  
make good your choice in the sentinels  
who are to watch your outward ports.  
Let no upstart politician, no mushroom  
in society be entrusted with the important  
concerns of your future prosperity; the  
time is come, when every exertion of a  
great mind, all the precious virtues of an  
honest heart, all the noble faculties of an  
elevated soul will be summoned into  
action.

For unless the heads of departments  
and the representatives of the grand  
councils of your country have virtue and

A letter from Capt. Kenney, of the sclar

### LOMBARDY POPLAR.

This tree, which has become an ornament  
to the city, we are sorry to learn, is sus-  
pected of producing a worm of the most poisonous  
description. The subject, we think, requires the  
most serious examination; and for the purpose  
of inviting to it, those who are best qualified  
by particular study or experience, we state the  
following fact, which has been communicated  
to us by respectable citizens.

On Monday morning at 10 o'clock an ex-  
periment was made in the presence of  
several gentlemen, with the view of ascer-  
taining the effect of the site or some of the  
trees of this republic. A Worm, found in a  
Lombardy Poplar, was placed in a glass, rather  
more than half full of water. In attempting to  
smell, she was sufficed in the nose. In about fifteen  
minutes she floated away, and remained upon the  
surface for five minutes; and in 15 minutes  
she had sunk to the bottom. The worm is a  
pale chocolate color, has a forked tail, a  
trident of the tail, being from the root of the  
tail. The body is very long, and is in  
each other four inch long. It is very  
truly strong and animated, and is able to
