On the 30th ult. in the vicinity of Sparrow's Point, an inquest was held on the body of a man, found on the shore, unknown. Any information relative to the deceased will be properly attended to by the coroner. From the appearance of the body, it is supposed that he had departed thence 5 or 6 days before the date above stated.

The brig *Culpsy*, Duvey, of this port, has been condemned, under pretence of trading from an enemy's port to another.

The brig *Two Brothers*, Seabury, of this port, was at Columbo on the 21th of March, waiting trial, and would probably be cleared.

The ship *Paulina*, Choat, hence, has arrived at New-Castle, Eng.

We are happy in having it, in our power to state that the representations, contained in a letter from a gentleman from Detroit, inserted in our last, of hostilities being meditated by the Indians in that quarter against the U. S. are altogether unfounded. Rumors to this effect have been circulated, but are probably, in a great measure, to be attributed to the arts of land-jobbers.

Yesterday arrived, ship *Perseverance*, Capt. Blackison, 68 days from Amsterdam, while off the coast of England, she was boarded by several ships of war and privateers, who all treated them politely, but on 2d inst. off our Capes, the day they took the pilot on board, they were boarded by an officer from a British 34 gun frigate, who was either afraid or alarmed to tell the frigate's name, they pressed the mate, a Philadelphian born, and took him on board, where they maltreated and infested him some time, when they returned him to his ship, having robbed him of his journal and some other small matters.

The above frigate was seen off our Capes on the 11th, 20 and 30 instants, and is supposed to be the *Cambrian* come to see if they can plunder a few of the citizens of Philadelphia.

Extract of a letter, dated 6 Uica, June 23d, 1866 from a gentleman traveling into the Michigan territory, to his correspondent in Boston.—No doubt, before this reaches you, accounts may be received of the hostile intention of the Indians, in and about Detroit, towards the United States. I wish to caution you against this species of information calculated only to excite the fears of those who are about to send goods into that country, and to prevent them, if possible,—so that those in the secret may monopolize the trade.—The letter further adds, that the source of the report has been sought, and it proves vague, and not entitled to credit. It may be pertinent also to state that from two to three thousand Indians and traders, annually assemble (at or near St. George, which is situated at the confluence of Lakes Superior, Huron, and Michigan) in the months of June and July, to barter Peltry for English goods, and other Merchandise. The beginning of this assemblage, probably served as a pretext for the rumour of hostilities.

The following is a copy of a letter from COMMANDORE PREBLE to the SECRETARY of the NAVY:
PORTLAND, June 17, 1866.

Sir,
BY Lieutenant Jones, of the Navy, I had this day the honor to receive your letter of the 17th ult. accompanying a Gold Medal, struck in pursuance of a resolution of Congress of the 3d March, 1865 emblematical of the attacks on the town, batteries and naval forces of Tripoli, by the squadron under my command. You will be pleased to communicate to the President of the United States, that I accept with gratitude this honorable testimony of the approbation of my Country. And I pray you to be assured that I am truly sensible of the very handsome and obliging manner in which it has been presented.
