POSTSCRIPT.

The British packet Windsor Cassle, which arrived at this port on Saturday, furnished the editor of the Mercantile Advertiser with London papers to the 9th of May; and yesterday morning we had the pleasure of completing our files of Lendon papers and Lloyd's list to the 17th, by the Kingston, from Liverpool. We have selected from the former whatever is interesting: and our commercial friends will find in the marine department some very valuable extracts from the latter.

LONDON, May 8. It appears that the king of Sweden has considered the attack of the Prussian troops, in expelling his forces from Lauenburgh, as a declaration of hostilities, and has put an embargo on the only two Prussian vessels in the ports of Pomerania. But whether there shall be war between Prus - 1 and Sweden will depend upon the court of Petersburgh. The Prussians by their own account of the action, had no mind to attack the Swedes; and the latter no disposition to an effectual resistance.

Letters from Suabia state that the head quarter of Marshal Ney which have long been at Ulm are about to be transferred to Strasburg. It is said also that Marshal Soult's corps is going to Italy.

Accounts from Constantinople state that some explanations have taken place between the Porte and the Russian minister, in which the Porte expresses a determination to remain neutral. The Russian minister says that all preparations on the frontiers shall be suspended and the Turks state that theirs shall be confined to the rebels in Servia. The French it is probable, will not suffer things to remain in that state, if it be true that their influence is of late so much increased

Gacta still holds out, by which the further operations in Lower Italy are much retarded. It is about to be cannonaded the fort, upon a hill, is so advantageous, that the bombardment produces little effect, and it will be very difficult to take it so long as the communication by sea is open. It was last night stated that intelligence was yesterday received of the Declaration of War by Sweden against Prussia.

We have stated, from the foreign journals, the accounts of the existing differences between Prussia and Sweden. We are still inclined to think that the Prussian government is and disposed to resent the conduct of the King of Sweden, which is attributed to particular circumstances and that unless, on the one hand, Bonaparte urge Prussia to attack Swedish Pomerania, or on the other Russia determines to go to war with Prussia, the hos ile occurrences which have yet taken place will have little consequence. As it may be thought Bonaparte's policy t embroil Prussia and Russia, he is perhaps willing to avail himself of the late incident to promote a rupture. A war in the north of Europe so manifestly tends to the interest of no party but Bonaparte, that he is the only one who can be desirous of producing it.

We have heard nothing to countenance this report. Some are of opinion, however, that the court of Berlin, under the direction of Bonaparte, may send a diplomatic agent here for the put pose of negociation, or at least of sounding the disposition of the government, and ascertaining the temper of the country .- The

ission of so eminent a person as the Duke of of Brunswick, whether his propositions were fit to be accepted or not, would be a pledge that the object was honorable.

May 13.

Mr. Jackson, lately Ambassador from this country to the court of Berlin, has arrived in London. He came over in the Ariadue frigate, from Husem, and landed garrison of Gaeta.

yesterday at Yarmouth, about Il o'clock, under a salute from the frigate.

Two Frenchmen landed-at Brixton in the Isle of Wight on Saturday from a small boat. They were immediately arrested, and afterwards underwent an examination. The reason for their quitting France in so perilous a way, the boat they came over in being only of about three tons burthen, has not transpired. Some say it was to avoid the effect of Imperial proscription denounced against themothers, that their business is with this government.

By letters received yesterday from Holland we learn, that the deputation which had been sent to Paris, from the Hague, had returned, bringing with it the fiat of Bonaparte. We do not suppose, merrow. that the persons who were appointed to that mission, durst remonstrate against the establishment of a constitution so contrary to the habits and feelings of the Batavians; but if they have, their represen tations, it seems, have been ineffectual. Bonaparte has decided, that they are to have a King in the person of his brother Louis. His future majesty, Louis the First, is at present much indisposed at Paris; but, if capable of undertaking the journey, he is, to be at the Hagne on Thursday next, between which day and the 20th he is expected to be proclaimed. The Dutch do not manifest proper gratitude for the favour which is designed for them. The nomination of King Louis, instead of satisfaction, has produced an universal depression throughout Holland. Some cities have even ventured to petition their High Mightinesses to oppose the measme with all their power; but though we may applaud and admire this faint effort of departed freedom, we cannot flatter ourselves with the expectation that it can produce any favourable consequences. I will be in vain to propose any opposition to the power that has long since ruled, and is now on the very eve of entirely revolutionizing the Batavian government. May 15.

At the Council yesterday it was resolved to issue letters of marque and reprisal against Prussian vessels, and the order in council will appear in Saturday night's Gazette. From that it may be inferred, that Mr. Jackson brings no intelligence from Berlin of a pacific nature.

Should the King of Prussta attack the King of Sweden, the Emperor of Russia will be compelled to declare whether he is-determined to renew the war or not But this, indeed, may depend upon how far the King of Sweden, in his late conduct and declarations, was warranted by the countenance and protection of Rus-

It is said, that Denmark has been induced to join the league of Russia, Sweden, and England, and that a treaty of alliance between these four powers was in great forwaidness.

Saturday last the Haughty gun brig cut out of a bay near Brest harbour a French chasse maree, which arrived at Plymouth on Tuesday. By this vessel intelligence has been received, that ten sail of the line are now at anchor in Brest Road, and that the Top ze, of 44 guns, which lately escaped from the Tagus, has got into Letters from Bombay, of the 18 h Ja-

nuary, confirm the accounts of the conclusion of peace with Scindia. Holkar, with a body of his people, had gone into the country of the Scheiks, but met with no encouragement; and as his followers were quitting him in despair, it was thought that he could give no farther trouble to the Brush government and its allies. .- He was desirous, on almost any terms, to make his peace.

Accounts had been received at Bombay of an action having taken place of Batavia, between an English frigate and the Semill nie French frigate The latter would have been taken had she not taken shelter under the batteries.

" The French troops under the orders of Marshal N.y, which were cautioned in the neighborhood of Memming n and Kempten, have begun to march towards the Rhine.

Prussia, that the Royal Chamber of Wat and Marine, at Koningsberg, gave notice including also 66.000 bushels of oats, would be sold in small lots. This intelligence has removed all apprehensions c a rupture between Prussia and Russia, and created the greatest consternation among the Jews, who, in the contemplation of a rupture, had collected vast quantities of merchandize, which they must now dispose of at a great loss."
