on the same footing as a Swedish one, as well in regard to the duty on goods imported and exported, as in the port charges which are considerably di linished; the duty on iron exported by a British, or other foreign ship, is hereby lowered 10s, sterling a ton, and proportionally on other goods. This will greatly facilitate the freighting of British ships, several of which have, since this law took effect, got treights for Ireland and Great Britain. But ressels that may come for freights ought not to proceed further up our river than the castle, and if they do not succeed in procuring them, go to the Baltic or elsewhere, without being subject to any other port charge than pilotage.
