Extract of a letter to a gentleman in this city, dated

Kingsston, (Jam.) 1st June. "I have one thing to mention on the score of business, which it would be well to attend to, that is, when shipments are made to this place, the bills of lading should say to whom consigned here; for if to the captain, or other alien, then he must throw it into the hands of a merchant here, and a duty of 2 per cent is claimed by the city of Kingsston." This has taken place, only since my arrival, and there is suits now pending on this very business with two vessels from Philadelphia.

On the subject of the Mirandola business, the New-York Daily Advertiser observes: "What will ye men think now, when a respectable jury, impartially selected, have, by their verdict, declared that Col. Smith, the man whom he has treated with so much indignity, has not been concerned in fitting out an armed expedition against Carraccus."

We continue to receive from the different states the honourable notices of the celebration on the 4th July. At Petersburg, in honour of the President was given as the toast, "Health to the Patriot who in despite of the aspersions of his enemies, maintains the first place in the affections of his countrymen." At Pittsfield, when the President was given as a toast, it was added, "the shafts of slander cannot reach him!" The Tammany Society, New-York gave, "The President—the philosopher & statesman; the natural and moral world are equally indebted to him for improvements—may he long live to promote discoveries in the one, and advance happiness in the other." An Artillery Company at New-York, gave as a toast, "The President of the United States—May the shafts of his enemies return with double force to their own bosoms." With pleasure we notice these proofs of the public affections, these increasing expressions of confidence, by which the public mind is enjoying itself in a language very different from that to which it has been accustomed. On Saturday, the 5th inst. a Negro Man belonging to Mr. McCordle, was executed in Lincoln county, for the murder of his mistress—he was tried on the 3d inst. when it appeared in evidence, that he had been rebuked on Tuesday morning, by his mistress, for beating his wife—after which he went to ploughing, and in about two hours afterwards, returned to the house with a club, went into the kitchen and knocked his wife into the fire, and was proceeding to further acts of violence, when Mrs. McCordle went into the kitchen, to save the negro woman, if possible, from further harm; when the fellow immediately knocked her down, and beat her till she was dead; he then run off, but returned in the evening for the purpose of procuring a horse, the more effectually to insure his escape; he was then

discovered and apprehended. He was sentenced to be burnt at the stake, which sentence was executed on Saturday last, in the presence of numerous spectators, who had assembled to behold the awful and shocking spectacle. He confessed the murder, and prayed with much earnestness for the divine forgiveness, until the violence of the flames destroyed the powers of utterance. [Augusta Chronicle.]

CHARLESTON, July 18. Gun Boat, No. 7, Missing—We are informed, and we communicate the intelligence with sorrow, that Gun Boat, No. 7, commanded by its lieutenant Ogilvie, which sailed from the port of New York for the Mediterranean, returned to that port, with the loss of her mast, and sailed a second time for her place of destination, has never since been heard of, and there is every reason to believe she is lost with all her crew.

Gun-Boat No 6, arrived at this port, has sprung her mast; but she is represented by her officers, to be a most excellent sea boat.

The following article is copied from a Charleston paper of the 15th July.

By a gentleman who arrived on Sunday last, from Cayenne, we are informed, that Jerome Bonaparte, who sailed under the orders of a French admiral was originally bound to the Cape of Good Hope, probably on his way to the East-Indies; but speaking a transport carrying some of the Dutch troops to Europe, he learned the fate of that colony, and of one of his frigates, which had entered it not knowing of its capture. He then intended to have proceeded to St. Helena, but, after cruising about for eight days they could not hit the island. The island probably had sunk, or the great nautical skill and long tried experience in navigation of the said admiral, had certainly found it. The fact however is that they could not find it; and they told this circumstance themselves at Cayenne.

There were great rejoicings in that colony on the arrival of a prince of the blood royal of France. The inhabitants had suffered so much under the detestable tyranny of Victor Hughes, that they immediately applied to the prince for some amelioration in their situation; but alas, he went off without doing any thing, and the old governor, irritated at their insolence, exercised more coercion than before, banishing some to remote and desolate parts of the continent.

Jerome Bonaparte declared it to be his intention, as he had been prevented in the East-Indies, to strike some blow, before he returned to France, that should immortalize his name. Then says he when the emperor shall applaud my conduct and say, "I rejoice, what shall I give you to reward you for your bravery?" I shall answer, "Sire, give me my wife—she is the greatest gift you can bestow upon me, and if you give me her, you will make me happy."—But says he, if he will not give me my wife, but still persists in refusing to acknowledge her, I will go home (calling America his home,) and never think more of leaving her.

If these be really his intentions, they do him honour; they prove him to possess a heart capable of feeling as a man; they prove him to be convinced, that the affections of an amiable and virtuous wife, are of higher value than the gew-gaws and tinsel of usurped nobility. The family of his wife are among the most respectable in the country in which they live; and should the mock emperor send his brother Jerome adrift in the world, without a live to buy at a shoe, the relations of his wife can render him independent, and her virtues will make him happy.

NEW SPECULATION.—A letter from Canton, (China) dated Jan. 19, 1806, informs, that a Nantucket ship had arrived there from the Friendly Islands, with three thousand Picols of Sandal Wood, which sold at 27 dollars the picol. The first object of the voyage was seal skins, which not succeeding, the captain turned his attention to collecting the Sandal Wood; in which he succeeded so well, that the whole cost, it was said, only 1500 dollars, sold for 78,000.

DROUGHT.—The last Danbury paper says they have not had a rainy day in that part of the country, (Connecticut) since the beginning of last spring. In New-England vegetation suffers for want of rain. In this quarter we have had several weeks of dry weather, to the great injury of the farmers and gardeners, till last week a few showers revived the parched and dying vegetables. (Hudson Bee.)

FLY IN TURNIPS.—Mr. Davy, the celebrated chemist, has lately suggested the following mode of preventing the ravages of the fly in turnips:—"As a mixture for steeping, a weak solution of oxymuriatic acid in water, will probably be found more efficacious than any of the substances which have hitherto been used. It was found that turnip seed steeped in it for twelve hours, sprouted two days sooner than seed that had been steeped in common water, and the leaves were much more vigorous. A compound which will answer the purposes of this fluid, is produced by mixing together 3 lb. of salt, 1 lb. manganese, 1 lb. of oil of vitriol (sulphuric acid) and 6 gallons of water; the preparation should be made in earthen

ware pans. The salt and the manganese should be first stirred together; they should be moistened by a quart of water. The oil of vitriol should be gradually poured in; water being added at the same time, till the whole quantities are used. This mixture (after six hours) having been occasionally stirred, will be fit for use: it should be kept in a dark place, and it is indifferent whether the clear liquor be poured off or used with the deposit." It is to be particularly observed, that the use of this receipt may be attended with danger to those who try it, unless done with caution. The effluvia should not be drawn into the lungs. (London paper.)

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

In a committee of Supply Lord H. Petty moved a resolution, granting to his majesty a sum of 300,000l. to enable his majesty to reward the officers, seamen and marines, under the command of the late Lord Nelson, for their valor and glorious conduct in the battle of Trafalgar.—The report was ordered to be received on Wednesday. And how was he to demonstrate this veneration? By saving the life of the grandson at the expence of the father's honor. Again we ask, is not the "season" almost arrived for this little Marquis to disburthen our country of its vices? [Inquirer.]

Extract of a letter from Aberdeen, in Saxony, April 27.

"The dreadful death and famine which distress our mountains, are particularly felt in our very populous town, where provisions are not abundant, and where 3000 Inhabitants are crowded together in 400 small houses. One third is so exhausted by famine, that many of them who might earn something by their labor, are so reduced as to be unable to do any thing, and are obligated to submit to their rigorous fate. Some relief, which they received from time to time, from charitable persons in distant parts, retard the melancholy end of these unfortunate wretches, which is inevitable, unless God himself rescues them from their misery. The young people are most to be pitied; cut of 500 children who attend the school, there are at least 100 who look like corpses. Most of them have no strength to go to school; they have no other sustenance but bread and potatoes, and those not in sufficient quantity for their support. In this situation they await their melancholy fate, extended naked in their huts." London Paper.

DESPERATE DUEL.

LEXINGTON, (K.) July 3.—By a gentleman who passed through the Cherokee nation a few days ago, we are informed, that a very extraordinary duel was fought there on the 16th ult. between James Vann and his brother-in-law, John Falling, (a half breed) in consequence of a former misunderstanding. Vann sent for his brother-in-law to meet him at an appointed place, about half way between their own houses, for the purpose of giving him satisfaction. They accordingly met, with their seconds, all armed with muskets and pistols. When they approached in sight of each other, they galloped up, so near that their horses heads were touching, when they fired nearly at the same instant. The contents of Vann's musket, which was 30 rifle bullets, entered the breast of Falling, and he fell dead from his horse; and was left on the ground until the next morning. Vann's coat sleeve was burnt with the powder of Falling's musket.

Caution to the Unwary. A General Court of Sessions held in Charleston, May 12, 1806, before his honor Judge TEEBERRY, came on the trial of Captain Joseph Baker, for swindling Bryan Connor out of ten boxes of sugar, was found guilty, and sentenced by the Court to pay a fine of 20 dollars, and to refund 794 dollars 64 cents to Bryan Connor—and if these two sums and cost be not paid, to be imprisoned six months, unless they be sooner paid. N. B. Since the above, Captain Baker was sent to jail, he sent for me, and said he was willing to pay me for the sugar, if he could get it from Joseph Sibley, said Joseph acknowledging that he was accountable to Captain Baker for 334 dollars 11 cents, which is as follows:—"Charleston, 8th August, 1805. "This is to certify that Joseph Sibley has entered bail for Captain Joseph Baker, in a suit brought against him by Bryan Connor, and to make said Sibley secure in the business, said Baker has deposited in Sibley's hands 334 dollars 11 cents, which said Sibley is accountable to said Baker for, as soon as the suit is determined."
