The ingredients of the former he states to be "grains of Paradise, Capsicum (black pepper) Corander, Coctus Indicus, f Quassia, Liquorice, brown Sugar, SCAG TOBACCO, SAL MANTIS or GREEN VITRIOL and the emmerates among the materials of the latter Cocculus Livigoricus or Spanish Juice, Treacle, Shag Tobacco, Alom, Green Vitriol, longglass, and Quassia!"

Mr. Malcolm is land surveyor to the Prince of Wales, and the Duke of York and Clarence.

Mr. Malcolm's account of the present inferiority of British potter is confirmed by the author of the "Monthly Commercial Reports," published in Phillips's Monthly London Magazine, under the direction of the celebrated Dr. Aikin. "After giving a melancholy statement of the dearness of coal, meat, and other common necessities of life, he adds, 'Pottery, when of proper strength and age, so excellent a beverage for the labourer, is by the impost levied on it an evil, now so poor a stuff, that a working man thinks it necessary to swallow immediately after his beer, a glass of poisonous gin, to hinder the former from doing harm.' See Report for January, 1804. The report for September, 1803, mentions 'the prices of Hops of 1801 and 1802, have fallen, the first to about 80s. and the latter which cost 10s. have fallen to about 5s.'" The report of the next month quotes English Hops in bags from 4s. to 5s. and in pecks from 2s. to 3s. In 1801, Hops in Philadelphia were 50 cents per lb. and the next year they were exported to London at 10 cents per lb.

Little British Potter is consumed in Philadelphia but in New York and Charleston, it is drunk in immense quantities. In Baltimore, too, the consumption is not so extensive, is nevertheless great.—Let the consumers read the above and tremble for deranged stomachs & bowels, and deranged brains, and learn to be content with our own unadulterated home made liquor. SALEM, July 22.
The ship George Washington, capt. Daniels, who arrived here on Thursday night last from Falmouth, which place he left on the 11th June, informs that all Prussian subjects, then in England, were imprisoned; that bread of every kind was becoming scarce and dear; that a Boston vessel, with flour, which had been detained, was cleared and the cargo sold at 16 dollars per barrel. Captain D. also informs, that a great many American vessels were carried in; but most of them cleared immediately. Nothing had transpired respecting the negotiation going on between the British government and Mr. Monroe.

TOLEDO, July 22.—On Thursday afternoon, a heavy cloud, of threatening appearance, rose from the Westward and passed on to the Eastward; the edge of it only touched this town and afforded us a gentle shower with very little wind. But in Beverly the rain was heavy, and the wind extremely violent. Its principal strength seems to have extended from Beverly bridge to a little distance beyond the south meeting house, or the breadth of about half a mile. Within this space, its force was tremendous. The roof of the meeting house was started, and considerably injured. A three story dwelling house of Mr. Chapman's, with brick ends, had several inches blown down, & the tenants at the bottom of the frame broken off; it is remarkable that another chimney, on a kitchen adjoining the house which had a weak stack, & about it, that might have been pushed over with the hand, stood unaltered, supposed to have been in the hollow of an eddy of wind which played round it, and passed off without doing any effect. A dwelling house of Mr. Herdick's was unroofed. A new house, just finished, belonging to a Mr. Eddy, was laid flat. A small store of Mr. P. P.'s, and a number of other small buildings, were blown down, and the planks of the bridge torn up. Many trees were torn up by the roots, or twisted off by the trunk. Stalks of corn, &c. which were broken off, appeared as if cut with a knife, owing to the circular force of the wind. A chimney on one house was actually turned round by it. In the bay, the George Washington then coming in, had a new sail torn to pieces in an instant, and many small vessels felt its force, but no material damage has been ascertained.—The violence of the wind continued about five minutes, and the rain not much longer. Further eastward, they had more rain, but little wind. We have not heard of its progress in any other place.

Mr. OGDEN'S TRIAL.
On Saturday last at 10 o'clock, the Circuit Court U. S. met pursuant to adjournment, present Judge Talmadge.
Mr. Golden, Mr. Hoffman, and Mr. Emmet, each spoke about an hour in favor of the defendant. The Attorney-General declining speaking in favor of the prosecution, Mr. Edwards, on the same side delivered a short speech; when the Judge delivered his charge to the jury, and the jury retired about 3 o'clock in the afternoon; at 4 they returned into court with a verdict of NOT GUILTY.

The decision of an honest and independent jury in the above cause and that of Col. Smith, has given universal satisfaction to the citizens. The trials, at full length, will shortly be published in a pamphlet by Mr. Lloyd, the celebrated Biographer. (N. Y. Gaz.)
