T a General Court of Sessions held in Charleston, May 12, 1806, before his honour Judge TREZEVANT, came on the trial of Captain Josiah Baker, for swindling Bryan Connor out of ten boxes of sugar, was found guilty, and sentenced by the Court to pay a fine of 20 dollars, and to refund 794 dollars 64 cents to Bryan Connor-and if these two sums and cost be not paid, to be imprisoned six months, unless they be sooner paid.

N. B. Sin e the above, Captain Baker was sent to jail, he sent for me, and said he was willing to pay me for the sugar, if he could get it from Joseph Sibley, said Joseph acknowledging that he was accountable to Captain Baker for 334 dollars 11 cents, which is as fol-LOW'S :-
