London, June 16.

The Gazette, of Saturday night contains an order in council for allowing friendly and neutral nations to trade to the Cape of Good Hope; prohibiting, however, the importation of Asiatic goods or military stores, except by the India company; and restricting exports generally without licence.

In the house of commons Mr. Wilberforce, after a few preliminary observations, moved that a humble address be presented to his majesty, beseeching that he may be graciously pleased to adopt such measures as to him may seem meet to induce America, and the powers of Europe, to unite with this country in a resolution to abolish the trade in slaves.

MARSHAL SWARTWOUT—It is reported, but we know nothing of the truth of the report, that the President of the United States has removed Mr. Swartwout from the office of Marshal of this district.

It is sneeringly intimated in the Evening Post of Saturday last, that the removal ought to have been made, if made at all, previous to the late trials of Smith and Ogden, in which case Mr. Coleman seems to intimate that the Marshal would not have had it in his power to select a jury to answer certain purposes. As Mr. Coleman, and the heads of the federal party, and the friends of our excellent and uncorrupt Governor, and the marshal, etc. have acted together on this occasion, he may be presumed to know something about it. There never was on any occasion, or at any time a more profligate, a more audacious, or a more unprincipled combination to calumniate the National Executive, and embarrass the operations of Government. New-York, August 4. ARRIVED.

The ship Romulus, Clark, in 57 days from Liverpool. Spoke, July 14, in lat. 44, long. 60, brig Julia, Howland, 45 days from Liverpool for New-Bedford.

The brig Juliana, Gale, in 90 days from Naples. Off Malaga, May 20, spoke ship Carpenter, bound up the Straights. June 3, off Gibraltar, ship William and Henry, Stewart, from Galipoli, for Hamburg, which had been plundered by a Spanish privateer; but afterwards supplied by the United States frigate Essex, off the Bay of Gibraltar. June 27, lat. 36, 38, long. 63, spoke ship Eliza, 14 days from Sakim; for Sumatra. Capt'n Gale was quarantined 60 days at Naples, on account of the malignant fever here last fall, although he sailed in January.

The brig Argus, Andrews, of Dighton, in 18 days from Antigua. Left brig Oliver, of K-nebeck, to sail in 20 days. July 27, in lat. 32, 35, fell in with the French fleet of two 80 gun ships, four 74's, and a frigate. Saw an English schooner they had sunk, bound to New-York with a cargo of rum. In lat. 35, 25, long. 64, 17, fell in with one of the 80 gun ships—she had in possession an English privateer, was stripping her, cut away her mainmast, and then let her go. The ship stood N. E. by E.

The armed ship Emperor, Lewis, in 16 days from Port-au-Prince.

The brig Eliza, Webb, in 5 days from Charleston. Sailed in co. schr. Adventure, Woods, for New-York. On Tuesday morning, off Cape Hatteras, saw four French ships of the line, two frigates and a brig steering for Cape Henry.

The schooner Second Attempt, Hall, of Boston, in 41 days from Madeira and Terceira. Left no Americans at T. July 5, lat. 40, long. 53, 49, spoke ship

True American, Isaacs, 10 days from N. York for Madeira, all well. July 6, in lat. 40, 6, long. 45, brig Eliza, of Boston, 7 days from Norfolk for Emblen; next day, schooner Union, Libby, from Madeira, for Philadelphia. July 17, spoke an English frigate.

Arrived this Morning, The schooner Industry, Caldwell, in 26 days from Montego Bay, Jamaica.—

A sloop had just arrived from N. York. The ship Cato, Bishop, in 54 days from Hull. Left, ship Susan, Wilson, to sail for New York June 25; and ship Indian Chief, Lilly, do. do. July 11, lat. 43, 30, long. 49, spoke ship Massachusetts, from Liverpool for Boston.

The brig Rockland, Rice, in 10 days from Matanzas. The ship Hercules, from Philadelphia for Havana, taken by a French privateer and retaken by a French privateer, had been sent into Matanzas; brig Hope, Morse, from Jamaica for Philadelphia, in distress, to sail again in 2 or 3 days; schr. M-Laughlin, for N. York, in 4 days; sloop Polly, in do. for New York. The brig James sailed 2 d. y. before for New York.

The schooner Thomas James, Motice, of Newbern, in 15 days from Point Petre, Guadeloupe. Left, brig John Langdon, to sail in 5 days for Portsmouth; schr. Almiral, for do. do. July 25, spoke the French privateer Prince Murat, from St. Domingo, and put on board captain Taverner, of the brig Diligence, from Kingston for Liverpool. They had also taken the ship Pandora, Lang, bound to London—both sent to St. Mary's.

Cleared, brigs Fame, Conklin, St. Thomas; Olive, Crowell, Savannah; Washington, Worcester, Guadeloupe; Eliza, Jon, t, Marseilles; Statira, Geer, Guadeloupe.

The ships Emperor and Indostan, conveyed as far as lat. 26, the schr. Squirrel, and William, for R. Limore.

Philadelphia, August 5.

On Sunday arrived the brig Pennsylvania, McPherson, 129 days from Canton. May 17, lat. 26, 32, S. long. 48, 32, E. spoke ship Superior, Breach, of New-York, 5 days from the Isle of France. Captain B. informed me that he was obliged to put into the Isle of France to discharge a part of his cargo, and take in sixty tons of ballast, that the ship then behaved well, and that they were all well on board. May 26th in lat. 31, 48, S. long. 30, 45, E. spoke ship Pengal, Donaldson, of Philadelphia, 27 days from Batavia. Captain D. informed me, that on the 6th of May, in lat. 20, 26, S. long. 70, 34, E. he fell in with the wreck of the ship May, Prescott, of Boston, from Canton, bound home, who was unfortunately upset in a squall on the 18th of March in lat. 15, 30, S. long. 93, 30, E. Captain found all officers and most of the crew alive on the wreck, but exposed to all the danger, and suffering all the miseries that necessarily attended such a situation—Two men were below when she upset, and were drowned, the carpenter died a few days after. Part of the crew mutinied while on the wreck; they formed a villainous scheme for murdering the officers whenever they should have the fortune to discover land. They were certainly very abusive to the officers, and continually endeavored to deprive them of every little comfort that providence afforded them. Mr. Samuel Speedwell first officer and Mr. R. Smith sailing master, and one seaman of the Mary went on board the Pennsylvania. May 28 in lat. 31, 00, S. long. 27, 00, E. spoke ship Eliza, Biddle, of Salem, from Sumatra, bound to Salem, all well. July 15, lat. 24, 40, N. long. 54, 25, W. spoke brig Betsey, Bowen, of Portsmouth from Boston, to Barbadoes, out 52 days, all well. July 23, passing by Bermuda, saw a squadron of men of war, at the east side of the island, 2 of the ships and a brig were at anchor under the land & 2 large ships and a brig were under sail, working up to the land.—The brig was to leeward of me, and boarded an American schooner, but did not detain her. They did not speak me.—24th, at 7, A. M. was boarded by the British brig of war Hawk, one of commodore Harvey's squadron, and treated us very politely—11 sail then in sight.

On Sunday arrived, schooner Dolphin, captain Labree, 77 days from Leghorn, and — days from Malaga. [Vessels left at Leghorn, the same as reported by captain Coffin of the brig Adair, who arrived at Newburyport, and whose list appeared in our paper of yesterday.] Left at Malaga the United States' brig Hornet, from France, bound up the Straits; ship Victory, Bickman, of Boston, bound for do.; brig South Carolina, Beinton, of Charleston, for do. in ten days.—Stopt in to water, seventeen sail of Swedish vessels conveyed by two Swedish frigates bound up the Straits. The 11th, in passing Gibraltar, was brought too by a Portuguese man of war brig on a cruise, then a ship and one Portuguese brig in company enquiring if seen or heard of any Algerine cruisers informed as below; at the same time saw and informed the American frigate Constitution, lying at Algiers Roads, and also saw in Gibraltar Roads, a large fleet of shipping and men of war; was the same hour brought too by a Spanish privateer from Algiers roads in sight, permitted to pass on. Sailed in company with the schooner Enterprise, captain Hull, of and for Baltimore, on the 23d May, parted company in thick weather and heavy gales. On the 29th, spoke the brig Eliza, Williams, of and from Baltimore, out 35 days for Leghorn, then in sight of Minor-

ca. June 21, was brought to & boarded by an English privateer of 12 guns, treated politely: the same day spoke the brig Adair, captain Hector Coffin, of Newburyport, from Barcelona, bound home, who informed me, he had been brought to by an Algerine ship of eighteen guns, two days before, and ordered on board, then a gale of wind, detained him four hours and robbed him of sundry valuable articles, threatened to lash him to a gun and treated him very shamefully! The ship had picked up a Danish brig, no one on board; they informed captain Coffin that the crew had left her previous to their taking charge. Captain C. has reason to believe the people were then either in confinement or all murdered—the ship with her prize, shaped her course for Algiers. On the 9th June entered the port of Malaga in co. with captain C. in order to get a supply of water, on our arrival captain C. immediately informed the American Consul of the treatment he had received, and the consul dispatched letters accordingly, informing him that he had not been the only captain who had been so treated; that an American captain had made his complaint in like manner & had received two dozen lashs, the seats of which he showed the Consul. On the 10th left Malaga, and on the 11th parted co. with the brig Adair.
