Some account of the country and productions nfar the Red River, in Louisiana. In an extract of a letter from Dr. J Sibley, to Dr. Calvin, of Ruleigh, duted Aatchitoches, July 10, 1804.

"The district of Natchitoches contains about 3000 inhabitants, strung mostly along the river, occupying its banks for about sixty miles, in which, till a short time ago, was a Spanish garrison, and now an American one.

"The inhabitants immediately on the banks of the Mississippi are less sickly than an the large rivers in the Carolinas and Georgia, probably owing to the immense depth and purity of the river water, which is always cool, and never eniis putrid miasma. On Red River it is much the same, with the difference only of the brackishbess offits water, from the great number of salt springs, lakes, and tereeks with which the count of canvas. try through it passes abounds : the water of the Red River is so salt, that wherever it is stagnant, large cockless clams, shrimps, ac. resembling those on the gen coust, are found in plenty.
