**FROM THE AMERICAN CITIZEN.**

**Young Austin.**—I am sensible of the impropriety of publishing any thing at this time on the untimely death of this amiable young gentleman, but my apology is the party paragraphs which have appeared respecting it in the Evening Post. Under the pretence of abashing party efforts, Mr. Coleman has wantonly called up party feelings. With what I have to say on the causes which led to the death of the young gentleman, I will however mingle as little of party as possible. The public seem to call for information concerning the murder. The facts which follow are verbally communicated to me by an intelligent gentleman from Boston, and they are strengthened by written information.

In Boston, as here, the federal party have for several years made it a point to discountenance the celebration of our independence, asserting that it is inconsistent with a cordial amity with Great-Britain. With them, therefore, to be consistent, the celebration was every year becoming more and more a farce. The republican party in Boston have, however, celebrated the day with splendor, and this year, clad with the fair prospect of republicanizing the state, it was commemorated by them with unusual magnificence.

Finding that they are descending in the state without perhaps the power of retarding their fall, the federal party, as a state trick, had this year recourse to a commemoration of the day. Resolving, as an expedient, to celebrate it, every thing possible was to be done to make a good exterior appearance.—They were sufficiently early in their arrangements to secure to themselves Faneuil Hall. As the republicans were to be together, they had therefore house accommodation to seek.

The republican committee, of which Mr. Benjamin Austin, father of the deceased, and known during the reign of terror as the writer of Old South, was chairman, waited on the keeper of the Jefferson Inn, at the foot of Copse Hill, and engaged with him by written contract to provide dinner for 400 persons.—He agreed to furnish 400 with dinner at one dollar each, the company finding their own wines. The innkeeper had resided in Boston but about 14 months.

As soon as the written agreement was made, the chairman of the republican committee, hearing that the Tunisian ambassador and Mr. Cathart had arrived in town, sent them a note of invitation to dine, which was accepted; besides these the committee invited eighteen gentlemen; there were therefore twenty extra covers to be furnished, which was stated to the Jefferson innkeeper, and to whom it was added that an adequate compensation would be made for the extra number. The day was joyfully spent.

A few days after the committee, with its chairman, called to pay their bill, which was stated by the landlord to be 700 dollars. The committee offered him 400 dollars, according to agreement, and 50 dollars for the twenty extra, but he insisted on 700 dollars, alleging that in bringing an extra number the agreement was broken. The inn keeper said that he had consulted with T. O. Selfridge, the murderer of young Austin, who had advised him to demand the 700 dollars, and offered to carry on a prosecution against the chairman of the committee for its recovery, gratis. The committee then offered the landlord 100 dollars for the extra number, but he refusing to accept it, the committee retired.

In the next number of the Repository, a federal paper, said to be partly edited by Selfridge, the committee and the republican party generally were attacked as a set of scurvy fellows who had not paid the poor inn holder for their feasting. The Repository is published by a coxcomb of the name of Park, who copying Mr. Coleman, imitates his meanness. Finding that Selfridge, for little party purposes, had thus abetted extortion, the committee to get rid of the inn holder whom they found to be a federalist, paid the \$700. After the money was paid the attacks continued in the Repository.

Mr. Austin, chairman of the committee, being told on the exchange as a sort of disgrace, that the man's bill was unpaid, he answered that it was not and added a relation of the part that Selfridge had acted with the landlord. Next day Selfridge met Mr. Austin in the street, and asked him if he had stated that he had advised a prosecution? He answered that he had, and that he could and would prove the fact. Having sworn that he would either make Mr. Austin "eat his words or make an apology," Selfridge retired.

The same evening, but without farther communication with Mr. Austin, Selfridge sent a note to a federal paper, "posting him as a liar, a scoundrel and coward." Mr. Austin received a proof sheet of the note the night before it was published, so that on the same day it was thus answered in the Chronicle, a republican paper.  
"Considering it derogatory to enter into a newspaper controversy with one T. O. Selfridge, in reply to his insolent and false publication in the Boston Gazette of this day; if any gentleman is desirous to know the facts on which his imputation is founded, any information will be given by me on the subject."
