MIRANDA .- We are credibly informed that on the first arrival of General Miranda at Barbadoes, Lord Scaforth, not having had any intelligence but from mere report of the nature of his expedition, purposed having him taken into custody, conceiving (as it did not ap pear Great Britain had any knowledge of the transaction) that he neight endeavour to revolutionize any country suitable to his purpose, as well as the Spanish colonies. A council was accordingly summoned on the business, who, after some deliberation, carried it against his Lordship, and give it as their opinion that assistance should be rendered him for the furtherance of his plars, upon which the Lilly. sluop of war and two gun-brigs, with private armed vessels, and a considerable number of men who enlisted under his standard, sailed from that island along with him for Trintdad, from whence they trere to proceed against Caraccas.

PARIS June 3. -IVe have received- London papers to the 14th May. The last debates in parliament are remarkable only for the complaints almost universally raised against the abuses which have crept into the financial administration of the war and navy departments. If Mr. Pitt was not directly guilty of those numerous malverreations, he cannot, however, be supposed to have been entirely lighorant of them: he was indeed an honest man so far as Jils own necuniary emolument was conterned ; jet he was by no means unwilling to wink at the most barefaced dilapidations, when committed by men reas dy to abet him in those schemes which were eyer attended with nothing but diss appointment, nothing but misfortune, nothing but the most pignal public disgrace. It must be observed that these complaints bear none of the maiks of those accusations usually brought forward by members of the opposition who wish to distinguish themselves, or to thrust themselves into the places of ministers. Here it is the Chancellor of the exchaquer himself who reveals the abuses and aavows the critical situation of affairs. It is after probing the wound that he publicly declares the danger. After such avowals, it ill becomes the friends of the factory. late ministry to defend their system and still vaunt their rigid probity. Even the acquital of lord Melville would not regain them the lost opinion of the public. upon this score.

According to the Spanish Gazettes, it appears that intelligence had lately been received in Spain from the different Spanish possessions in the new world. At the time of the last dispatches from thence the most prefect tranq ility prevailed in the island of Cuba and throughout all the Mexican provinces. The French and Spanish privateers continue to lay waste the English commerce, and to interrupt the Americans in their fraudulent communications with the revolted negroes of St. Domingo. In the space of three months no less than 87 American ships were carried into the ports of Cuba.
