

Reppahannock was almost stopped at the falls.

We were misinformed, in stating yesterday, that the whole of the crews of the two ships, belonging to Miranda, had been put to death by the Spanish government of Caracas: their fate, however, is equally, deplorable. The following whom we presume held commissions under Miranda were put to death, and their heads exhibited as stated yesterday, a few days previous to the sailing of the Endymion; the remaining 48 were sentenced to 10 years imprisonment in the mines.

JAMES LEDLIE, formerly of this city, was induced to join the expedition at Port-au-Prince, and is said to have had the commission of a major. He was naturally fond of enterprise.

Mr. Lippincott—a young gentleman of amiable and respectable connections in this city.—He also joined the expedition at Port-au-Prince; and was no doubt seduced into the fatal project.

Capt. Donahue, also of this city, who has left a wife and a small family, to deplore his unhappy end. He commanded a vessel belonging to this port; and urged by the insidious temptations of Miranda's agents, abandoned her at Port-au-Prince, and entered into a cause which has cost him his life.

Mr. George Kirkland.—This gentleman was formerly a captain in the Provisional Army of the U. States, but was discharged on the reduction of that establishment. He was afterwards concerned in the publication of the Washington Federalist. He was not deficient in many of the ornamental and useful attainments of literature. He afterwards commenced commercial business in this city, but proving unfortunate, adventured to Italy with a view, it is said, of offering his military talents to Dessalines. He there joined Miranda and is represented as holding a very important rank in his establishment.

Capt. Gardner.—Of this person we have no knowledge.

Paul George.—We are equally ignorant of this character; as well as of Mr. Smith, a butcher of New-York, and a Polish Gentleman.

We have heard some individuals express a doubt of the truth of the above melancholy intelligence. We are sorry to observe that the sources through which it has been received, admit of no such consolatory hope. Four boys only belonging to the crews, had their fates undetermined.—They were still confined in the castle.

LATEST FOREIGN NEWS.

Last evening we were politely favored with Liverpool papers to the 3d and London to the 2d of July, both inclusive, received by the ship Abrona, captain Hobson, in 51 days from Liverpool. The only articles of any interest in these papers are the following:

LONDON, July 1. The Omnium was, at twelve o'clock this day, at 6 1/2. and the other funds were in the same proportion. After our paper was put to press yesterday, we learned that dispatches had been received from France, forwarded by Lord Keith, from off Boulogne. We repeat, that a negotiation is in a train, and that it is the cause of the improved state of the funds.

We received yesterday, a letter from a respectable house at Hamburg. It gives the following article, which, it adds, was communicated by the French minister in that city, as the outline of the expected changes on the continent.

New Constitution of Germany. Bavaria, Wirtemberg, Baden, which is to be considerably aggrandized, Nassau, and some other districts, comprising the country all along the Rhine, to form a federative body, under the immediate protection of France.

Switzerland to be divided. One-third to be given to Baden, one-third to the kingdom of Italy, and one-third to France.

Denmark and Sweden, excluded from Germany, and from all deliberative influence in its affairs. The former to remain distinct for itself—the latter to be treated, as to Pomerania, as she may behave. Some say Pomerania and Mecklenburg are both to fall to Prussia; which, with Austria, are independent powers, and on their own bottoms, without regard to the former system of the empire. The emperor of the latter to resign his title of chief of the German empire remaining only emperor of his own states.

Hamburg, and some say all Holstein Bremen, and Lubeck, federative and independent, under the protection of France—whose emperor is to enjoy in those territories henceforward, the same sovereignty which the emperor of Germany formerly exercised.—The inhabitants of this federative state shall be called the Franks, being the land where the ancient Franks sprang from.

Diet of the empire to be abolished.

Saxony, not mentioned.

These alterations to take place immediately; the army then to be called back to assist at the grand festivals at Paris, which are to take place very shortly.

Yesterday policies were opened in the city, giving 5 guineas to receive 100, if preliminaries be signed within a week, and be actually followed by a peace; and 15 guineas to receive 100, if preliminary be signed within two months.

The stocks have experienced a rise to day; Consols are up to 64; reduced, at 62 5/8; Omnium is up to 7; a rise of one half percent, since yesterday.

The report in the city yesterday was, that Mr. Fox had sent his confidential secretary after Mr. Adair to Vienna, with instructions, by which the latter may be enabled to open a communication with Mr. D'Oubril, the Russian minister at that city, and conditionally proceed with him to Paris. The funds were not much affected by this new rumor.

July 2. Baron Jacob, the Prussian ambassador, has applied for his passport, preparatory to his leaving this country for Berlin.

We are happy at having it in our power to acquaint our readers that Mr. Fox was yesterday so far recovered as to be able to sit down to dinner with the earl of Moria, lord Holland, lady Louisa Conolly, and a few other friends.

Government has received advices from Mr. Stanley, the British consul at Trieste, stating that a proclamation had been issued at that place, bearing date the 29th of May, which notified, that such English and Russian vessels as might be in the port of Trieste, or any of the ports of the Adriatic, were to quit them in the space of three days, unless prevented from so doing by stress of weather; and that the said ports would continue shut against the English and Russians.

Corn Exchange, July 3.—At the new market, this day, which is open on Wednesdays, during the repairs of the principal, there are not many supplies of corn in general; the samples of what of inferior quality still remain almost without buyers; the terms of flour have small fluctuation, and the few azles, made of corn, have but little variation from the prices quoted on Monday.

LIVERPOOL, July 3. By the bill now pending respecting the abolishing of certain fairs and holidays at the Custom-house, all the red-letter days in the calendar, except the birth days of their majesties, Good-Friday, and Christmas-Day will be abolished.

The hay harvest, in several parts of the country, is reported to be very plentiful; and as to the corn, there never was a finer prospect of an abundant crop.

We were informed, by a gentleman arrived yesterday from Norfolk, that on Friday and Saturday last, the weather was so tempestuous, as to occasion much damage in that port to several square rigged vessels and small craft: he states, that the impetuosity of the wind destroyed six or seven houses.

Extract of a letter from a gentleman in Liverpool, to his friend in Wilmington, (Del.) dated June 19, 1806.

"I have just had the pleasure of handing on shore from the Diana, from Baltimore, the family of our envoy, Mr. FIVE-MYX, who dropped in upon us quite unexpectedly this morning. His arrival appears to have diffused general joy throughout this city, and has in a great measure dispelled the doubts which have been entertained by many, of a rupture between the two countries ever since the affair of the Leander transpired.—To-morrow, I understand, the merchants of Liverpool intend giving him an elegant entertainment. All the Americans displayed their flags on his landing, and showed him every mark of respect in their power. From his manners and general character, I am induced to believe, that our government could not have appointed a person better, qualified for the task of conciliation. His having brought his lady and a large family of children with him, is a favorable omen, and impresses us with the idea of the confidence of our executive, in being able to bring our affairs to an amicable adjustment. For my own part, I never entertained the smallest idea of their resorting to hostilities, but I assure you, that the majority of the people of England, as far as I can inform myself, viewed the business in a very serious point of view."
