It was contended by some, that oats vegetated on a dunghill, after passing whole through the stomach of a horse. And on the other hand, it was stated that, although whole oats were to be found in horse dung...

I beg leave to state, that I accidentally noticed a large quantity of whole oats in some dung just passed from a horse, and upon examining them, they appeared to be quite sound...
