I beg leave to state, that I accidentally noticed a latge quantity of whole oats in some dung just passed from a horse, and, upon examining them, they appeared to be quite sound; I thereupon had the dung mixed with mould in a garden pot, and in about a fortnight the oats began to vegetate very freely, and are at this time. two or three inches above ground.
