We must add, that our markets are abundant and cheap; and what is still more pleasing, that the citizens of Augusta have not enjoyed such a perfect state of health, for many years past, as at the present season.

The others were sentenced to ten-years confinement in irons, and had been distributed in different castles.

From London, June 17, 1866.
I have enclosed a few papers by the Sarah. I wanted much to send The Times, of this morning, which denies the report of Lord YARMOUTH's having gone to Paris, to negotiate with TALLEYRAND, or otherwise of carrying a favorable answer from Mr. Fox to the proposal of a negotiation for peace. I cannot conceive of a peace between this country and France, on any terms of safety, while one commands the Continent, and the other the ocean. This is the general opinion here, however the present administration may be inclined to peace on almost any terms,

they dare not make it, unless it combines security.

As to a war with America, I don't think it even probable. On a proper representation by negotiation, justice will be done where injury has been received. The Administration are much more friendly disposed towards the United States, than the people, more particularly some of the merchants.

Mr. Sullivan, private Secretary of Mr. Bowdoin, has arrived here from Paris. He is said to have brought dispatches from Mr. Munroe, and is only six days from Paris. Something about Spanish cessions is spoken of; but what I have not heard. Portugal, it is said, is to be extinguished as a kingdom, and become a Spanish province; and Spain is to cede some of her maritime dominion to France.

New-York, August 27.
Arrived, the ship Four Sisters, Latham, in 49 days from Dublin, July 19, in the British Channel, spoke the ship Hampton, 27 days from New York for Liverpool. The ship Catharine, Dowdall, of New-York, sailed for the Mediterranean the middle of June.

The ship Triumph, Coggeshall, in 61 days from Liverpool. Spoke, July 21, in lat. 44, 21, ship Enterprize, Patterson, from New York for Bordeaux. August 12, in lat. 41, 53, ship Armon, N.Y. from New York for Antwerp. 14th, in lat. 41, 41, was boarded by the British frigate La Cornelia, of 43 guns, who pressed Nicholas Francis, cook, for protection, and ill-treated captain C. 21st, in lat. 40, 19, schooner Elizabeth, Morse, 3 days from Portland for Gloucester; was supplied by her with a barrel of bread and some potatoes. 22d, in lat. 40, 7, brig Amazon, from Wilmington for Newburyport.

The brig Ranger, Rates, from the Ile of France, and 78 days from Bourbon. The ship Brilliant, Minugh, was at Bourbon, detained by the French Frigate Cannonier, on suspicion of supplying a British frigate; the supercargo was detained on shore; but it was supposed she would be released immediately. Left at the Isle of France, May 18, ship Shepherds, Gardner, for New York, tea for tea; schooner Regulator, Depavert, of New York. At Bourbon, ship Tepeze, Curris, of Boston. Spoke July 20, in lat. 23, long. 55, ship Libra, 24 days from Newburyport for Guadaloupe. 21st, in lat. 35, long. 78, brig Friends Adventure, Dodge, 3 days from Bermuda for New York. On Sunday off Barnegate, in 20 fathoms water, saw a dismasted schooner, The Isle of France was blockaded by a British 74 and a frigate.

The 17th of June, off Carthage, spoke ship Mary of Newburyport, from Sicily for Lisbon, then under the command of Thomas Stevens, the mate, she having lost her owner and captain, the latter died the 15th of June; July 24, lat. 38, 32, long. 47, spoke ship Beaver, from New York for Canton, out 11 days, all well. August 14, lat. 36, long. 68, 30, spoke the ship Philadelphia of Philadelphia, for Hamburg, out 4 days; and on the 17th August, lat. 39; 32, long. 69, spoke schooner Portsmouth, of and for Portsmouth, from Trinidad, out 20 days.
