Mr. Pechin, IN your paper of Saturday last, I observed an illiberal attack (though guarded ingeniously) under the signature of W. intending to prejudice the voters of Baltimore city, and divert their suffrages at the approaching election for members to the general assembly from a worthy and deserving fellow-citizen, a man of education, to one of experience of reading, law and legislation.

Who are the candidates? Elias Glenn, a lawyer, lately one of the associate justices of the civil court—it is not him alluded to. T. Bland, a lawyer, a man of reading and letters, "who has spent his juvenile years in diving into judicial affairs, and plucking the flowers from its leaves"—not him.

E. Aisquith, a young man of some natural abilities and has read a little of the law, and more experienced in the fine arts, than any of his competitors—not him. Last, and not least in the respect of his fellow-citizens, Robt. Stewart, a mechanic, and one who believes, as every real republican ought to believe—that high birth does not give talents; that the son of a king may be a fool and the son of a blacksmith a man of sense—that a mechanic possesses as much discernment as a lawyer and is as competent to know the real interests of his country.

Robert Stewart is a man who by honest industry has accumulated an independence, who wants neither place, office nor patronage from the governor, and wishes nothing more than the prosperity of this city, and the mechanic interest particularly—I say it is him alluded to, and let every well-wisher to his election say to his friends, read the character given of him by the enemies of his election to the assembly.

"I allude, sir, to a person whose merits are unexceptionable in the private paths of life, whose probity and integrity defy the base tongue of calumny, and whose services as a citizen have been highly extolled and much sought after."

"Remour of Peace"—Captain Pease, of the schr.
