

Philadelphia, September 4.

Cleared, schooners Happy Couple Folger, Boston; Packet, Luce, sloop, Mary, Dryden, New York; Little Will, Oliphant, Baltimore.

Yesterday arrived, brig Cyrus, Smith, from Havana, and left there the 12th of August; the Rajah, Smith, just arrived from New York; the ship Citizen, Allen, of New York; loading; the brig Reynolds, of Kentucky, loading for this port. The sloop Hannah and Mary, Hughes, of this port, was sold at Havana. Market dull, brown sugar 5 55, white 8. American produce and dry goods, plenty and low.

Same day arrived the brig Hope, Morse, from Matanzas and South Carolina. In the late gale she carried away all her masts and received considerable other damage. On the 26th July, a few miles to the northward of Cape Hatteras spoke the brig South Carolina, Serail, from this port for Charleston, who had lost his small boat and had some of her bullworks stove in, other ways all well.
